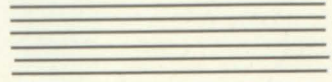
IN MEMORIAM

JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

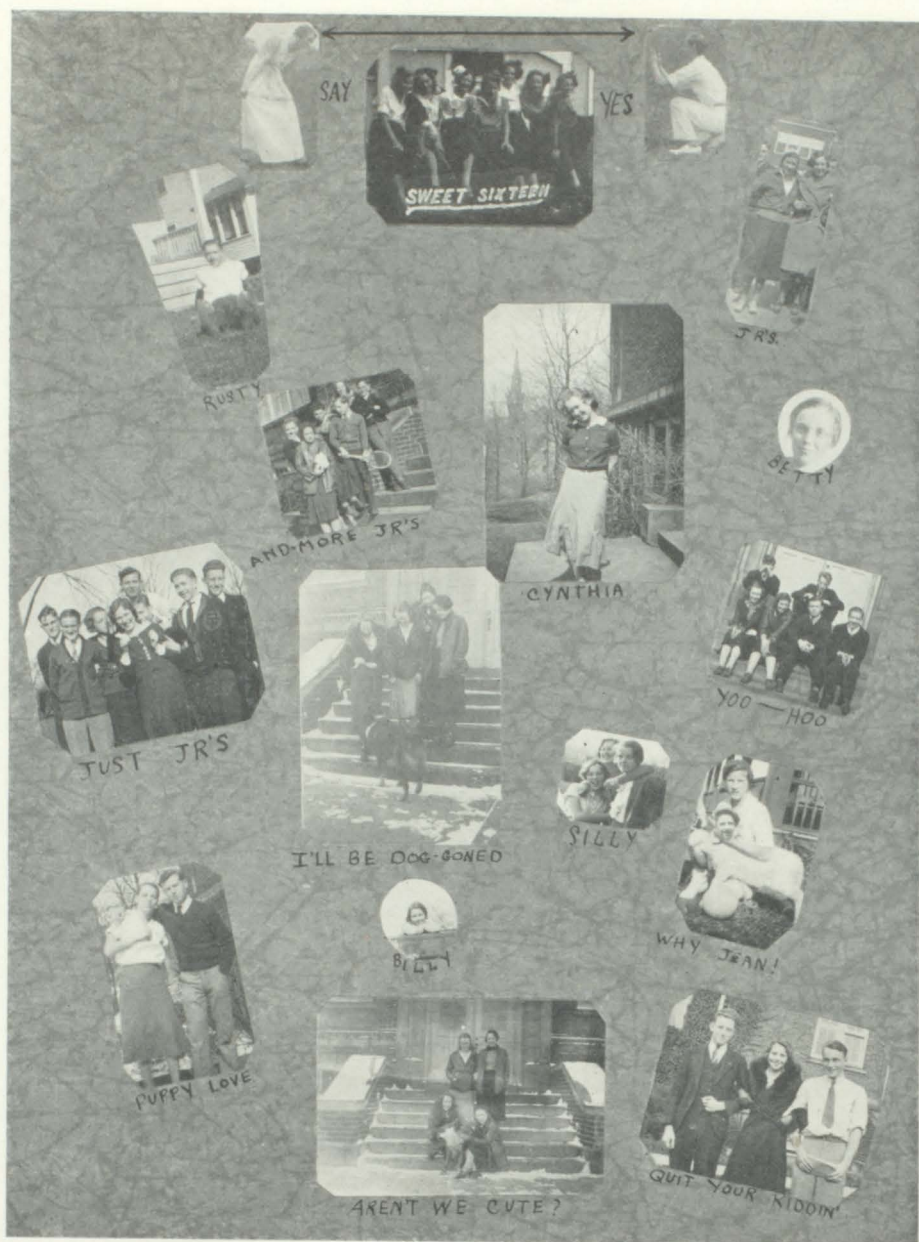

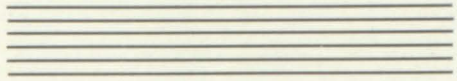

SOPHOMORE CLASS HISTORY

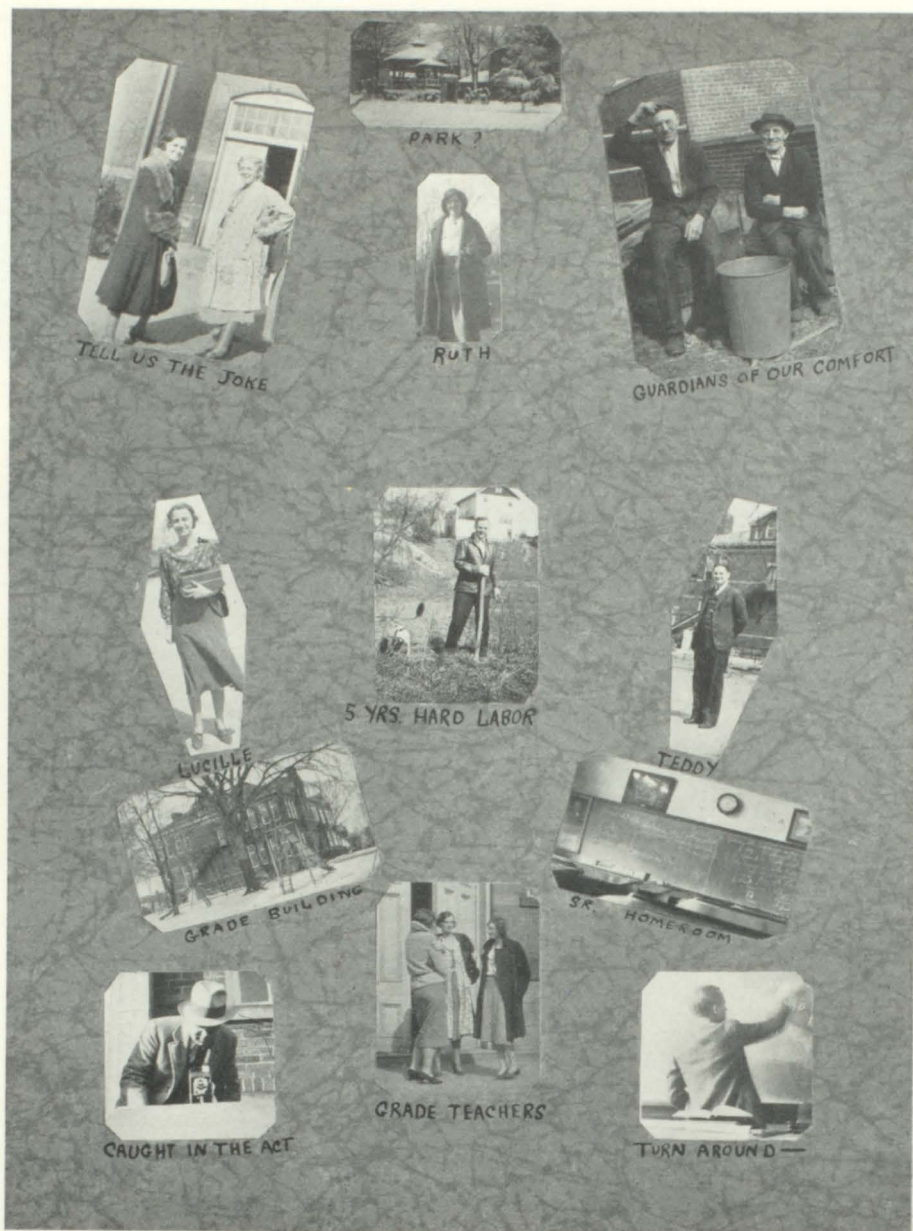

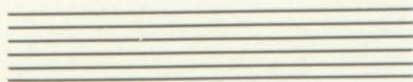

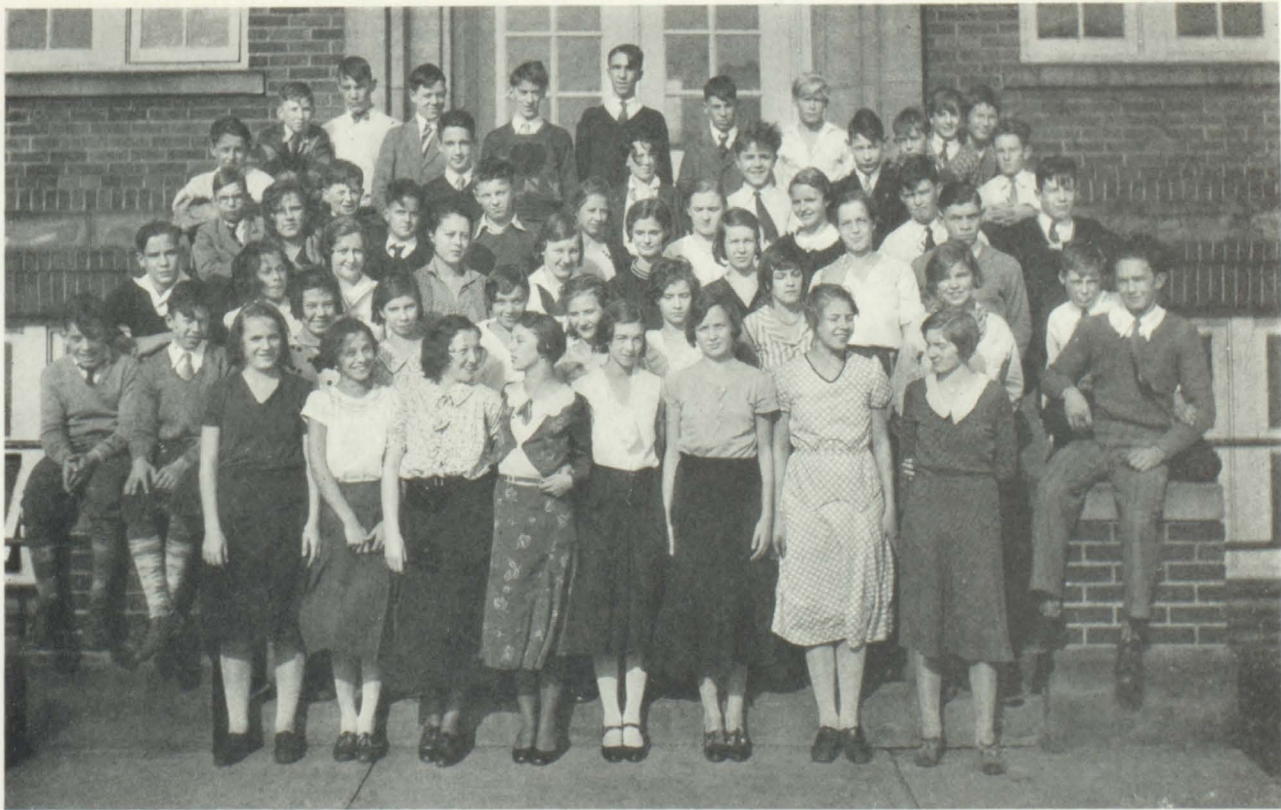
FRESHMAN CLASS HISTORY

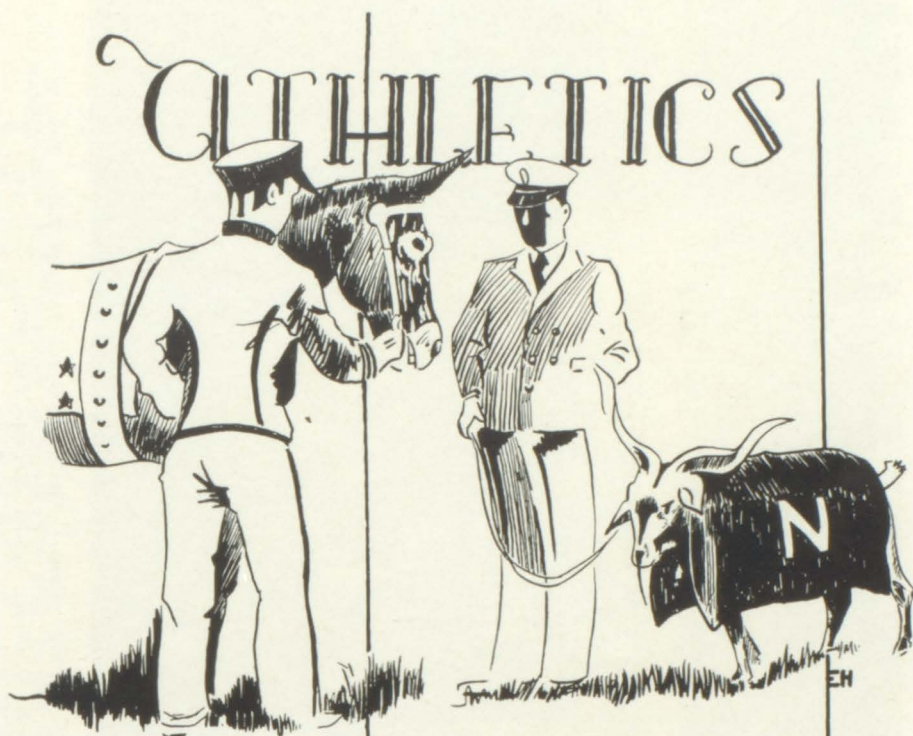


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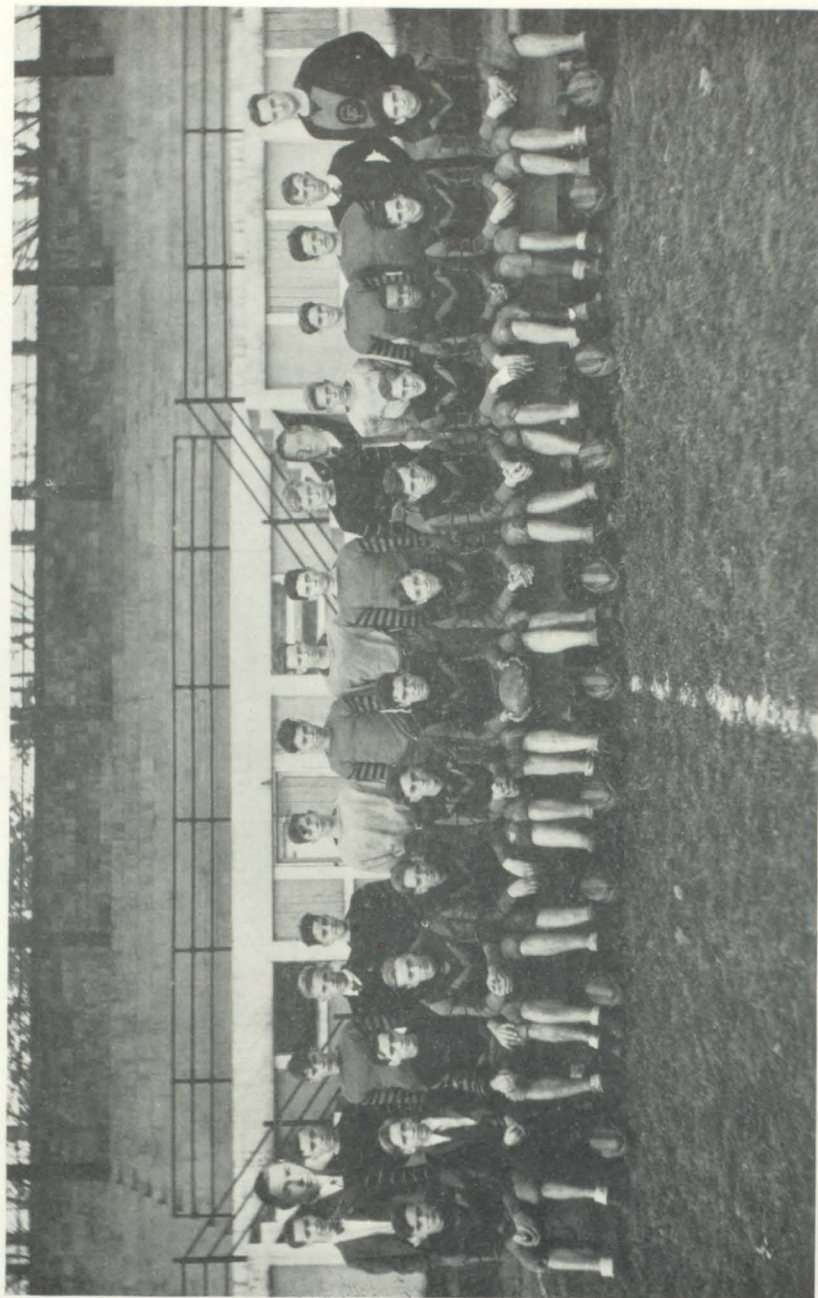

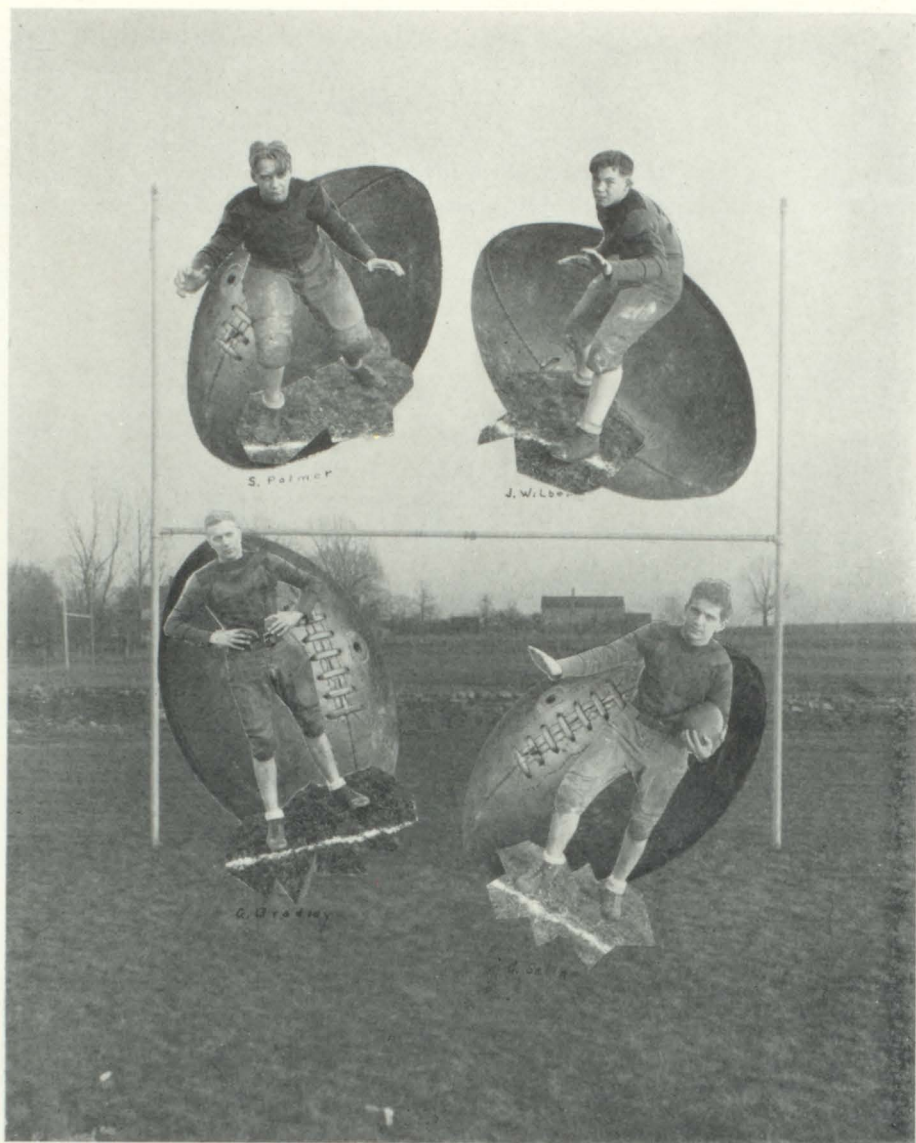
"Dick" played beside his brother, and did they play? Dick was light, but he made All-County and he still has one more season to play.

Guard

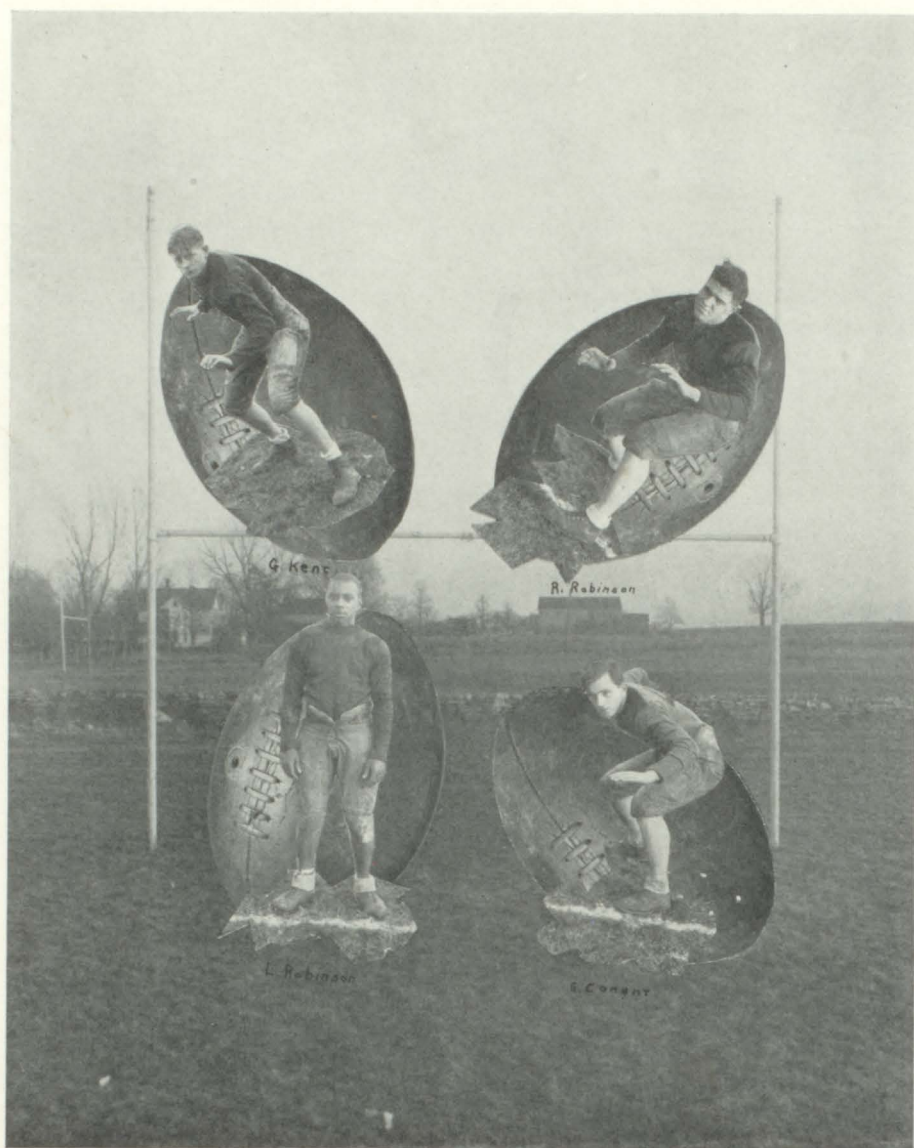
"Johnny" was just a Freshman but he was substituted in enough games to win his letter. He has three more years to go, so you will hear more of him.

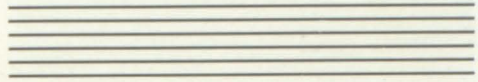


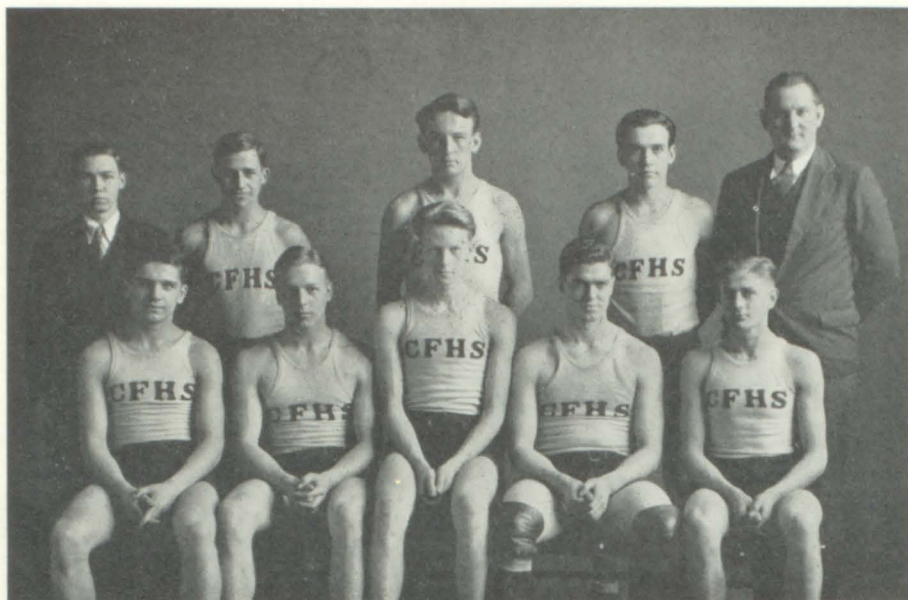

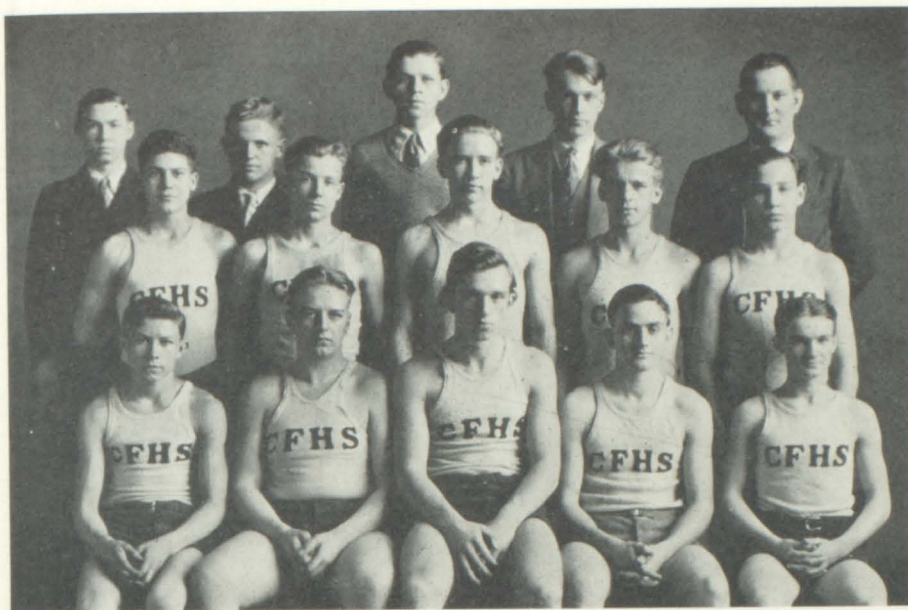

There is no definite league but Chagrin's old rivals; Solon, Independence and Mayfield form an unofficial loop. Mr. Glover is the boys' mentor this year.

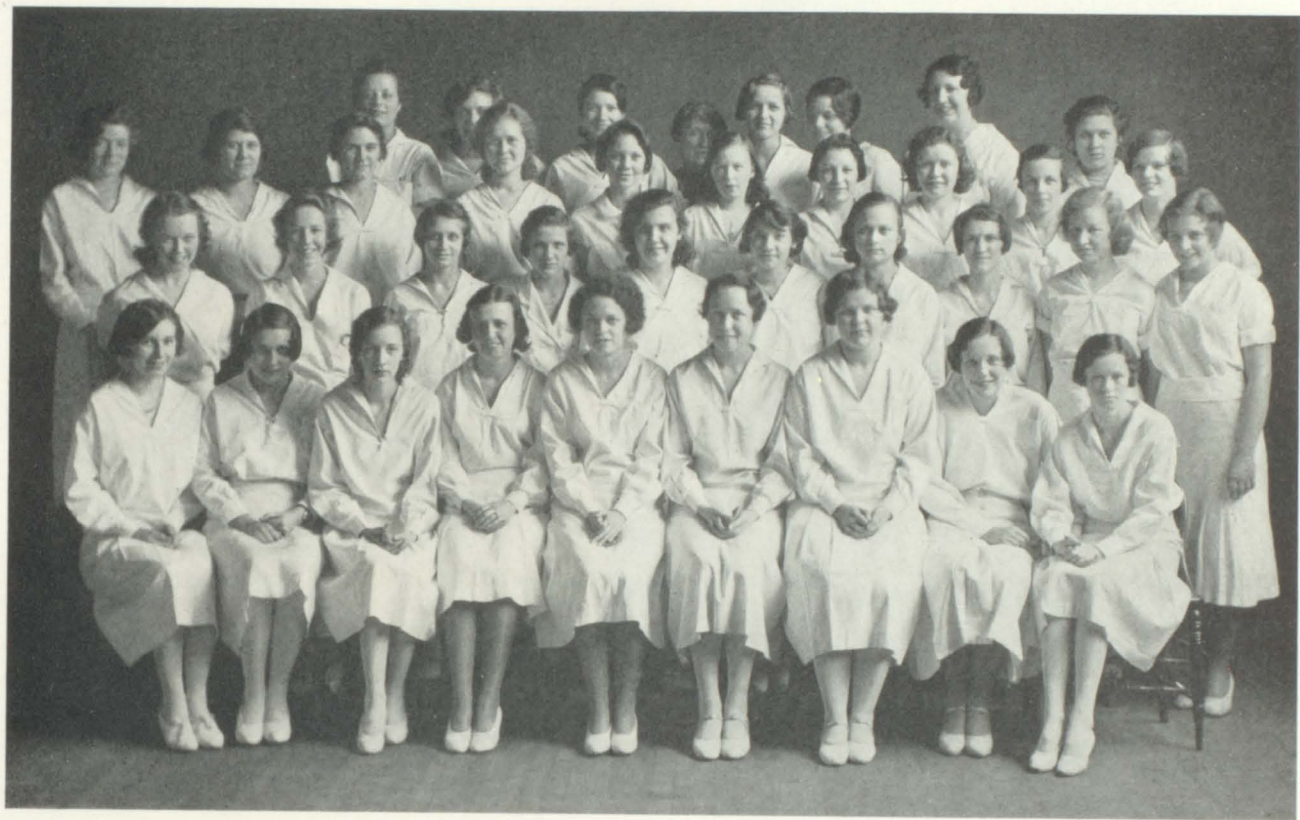
TRACK 1931

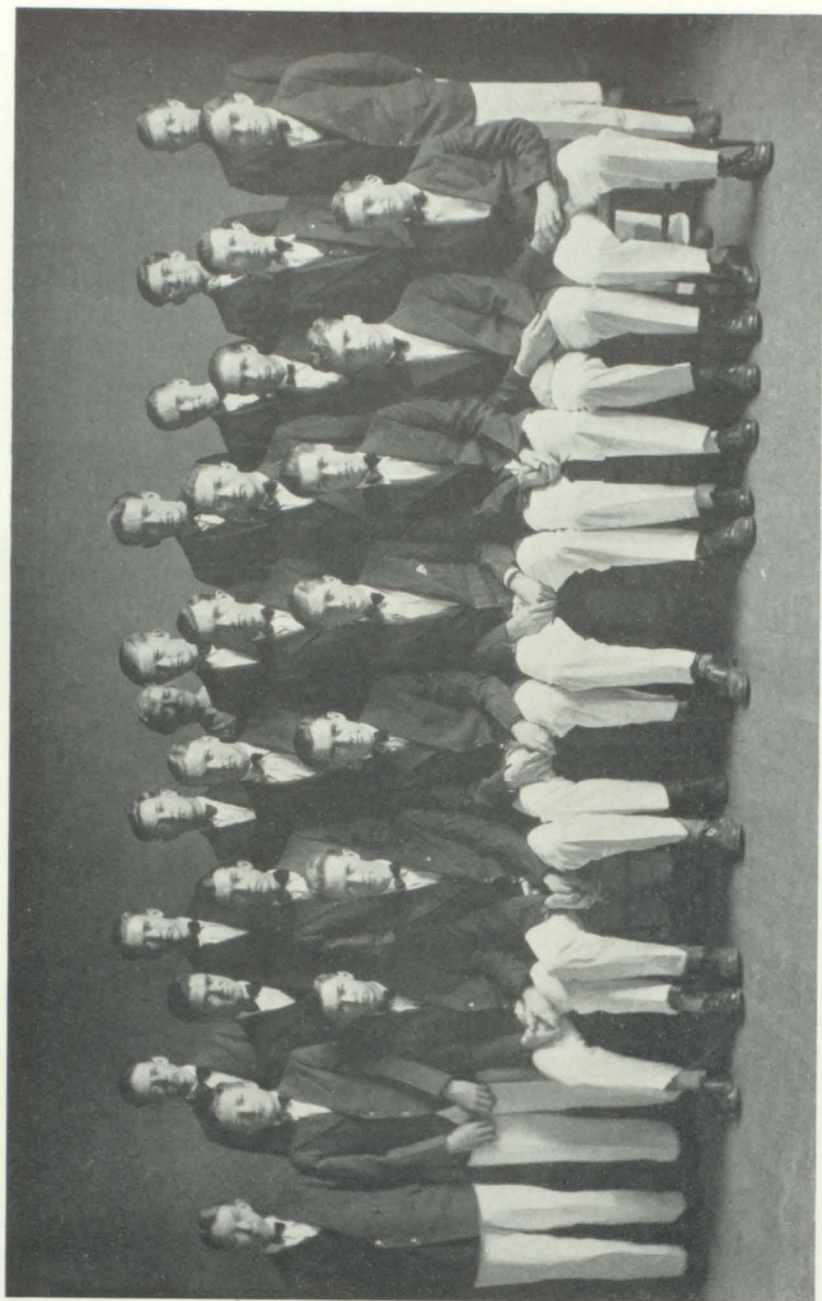
As only five voices were lost through graduation, the club is looking forward to another successful year in 1932-33 under the capable leadership of Mrs. Fouts.

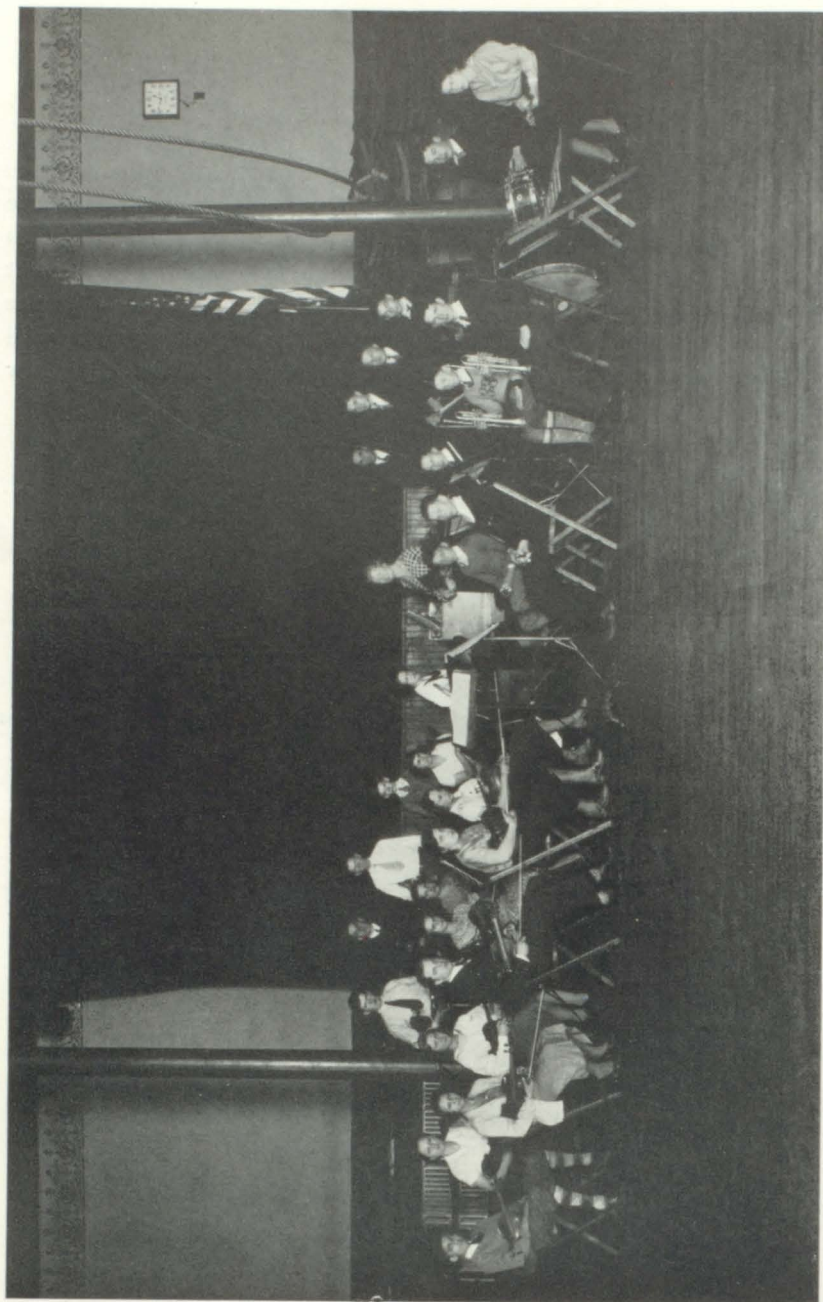

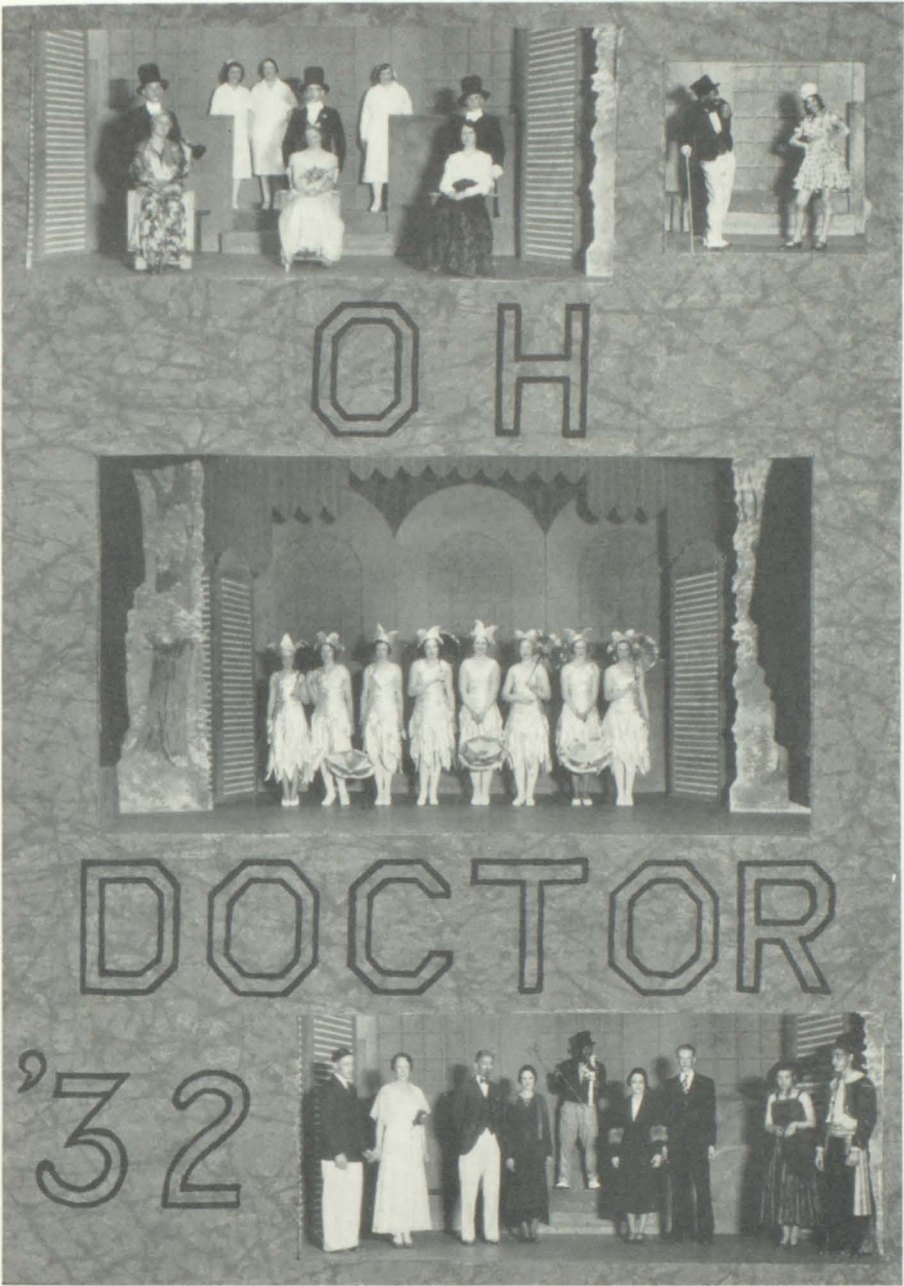

Years before, Philip's grandfather and Dr. Drinkwater had quarreled, and Drinkwater has forbidden Philip on the place.

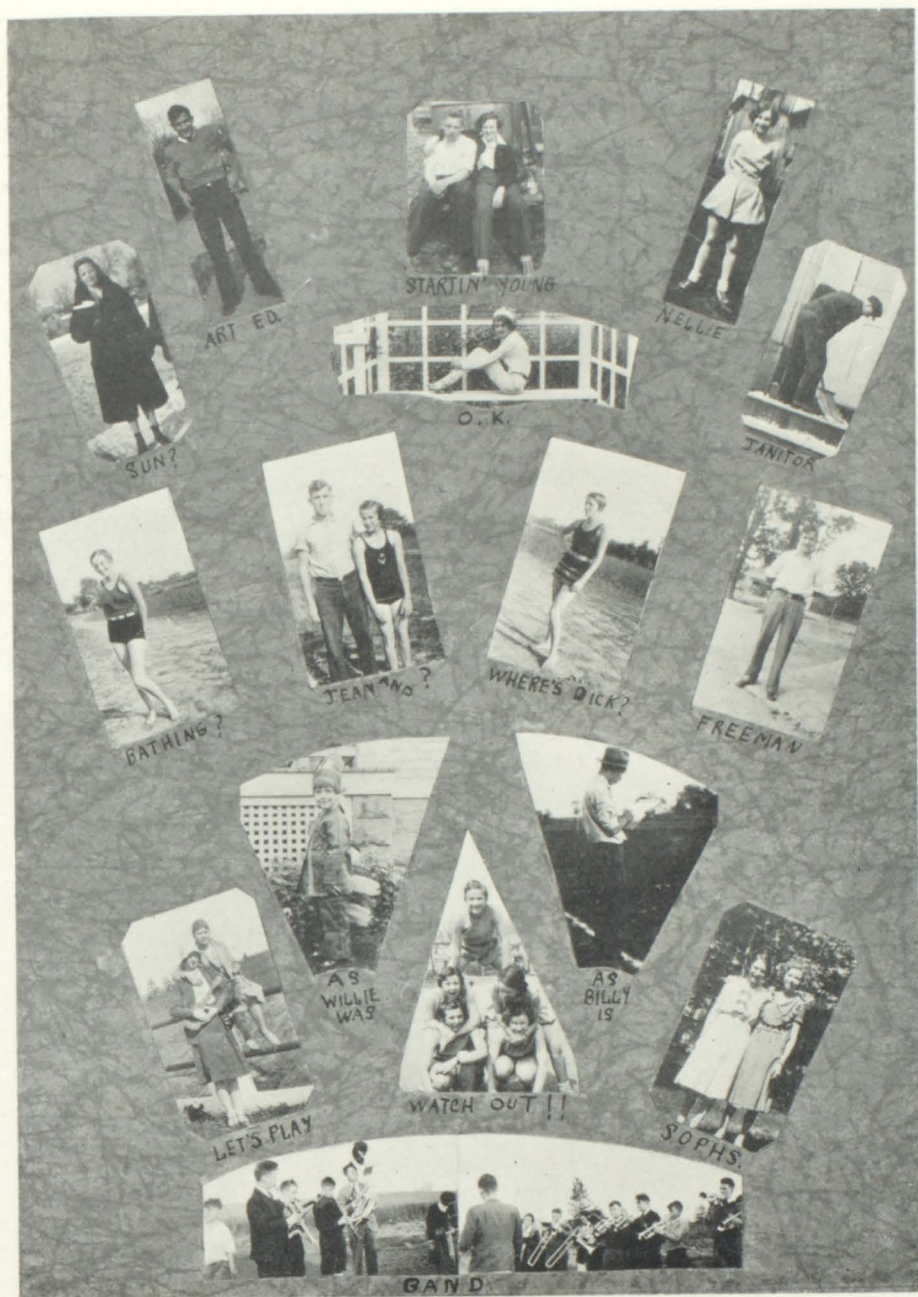

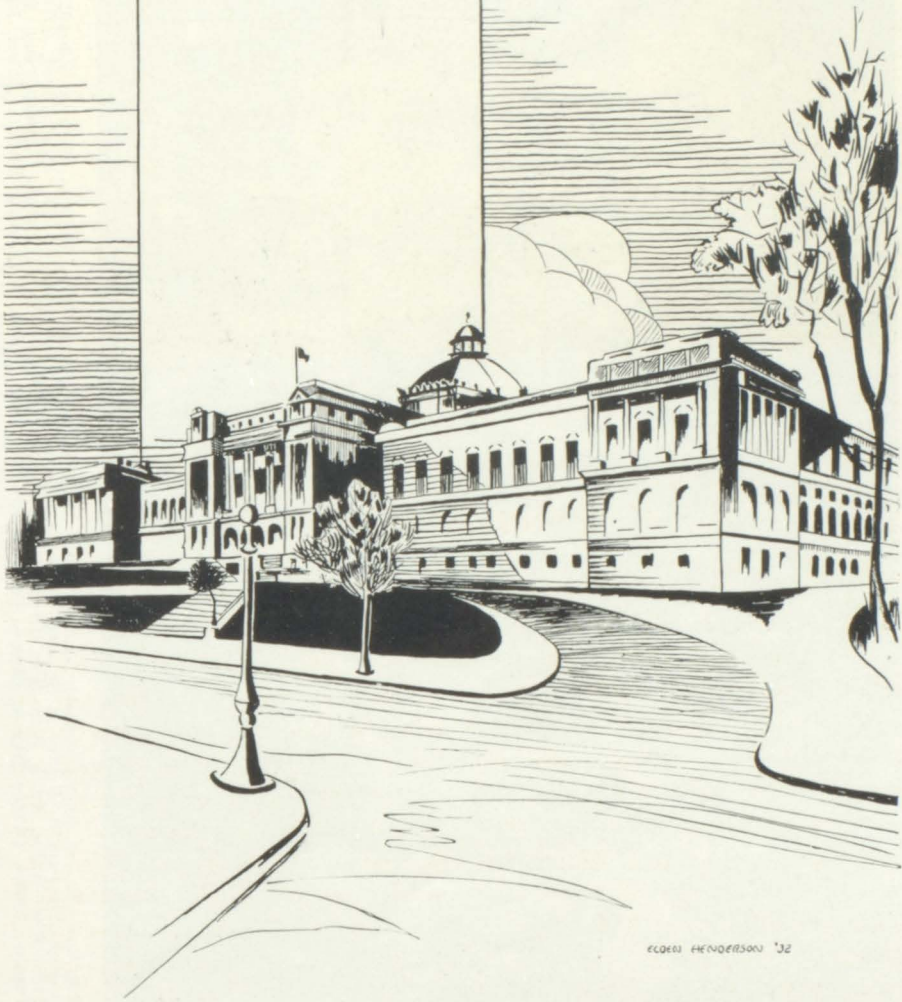

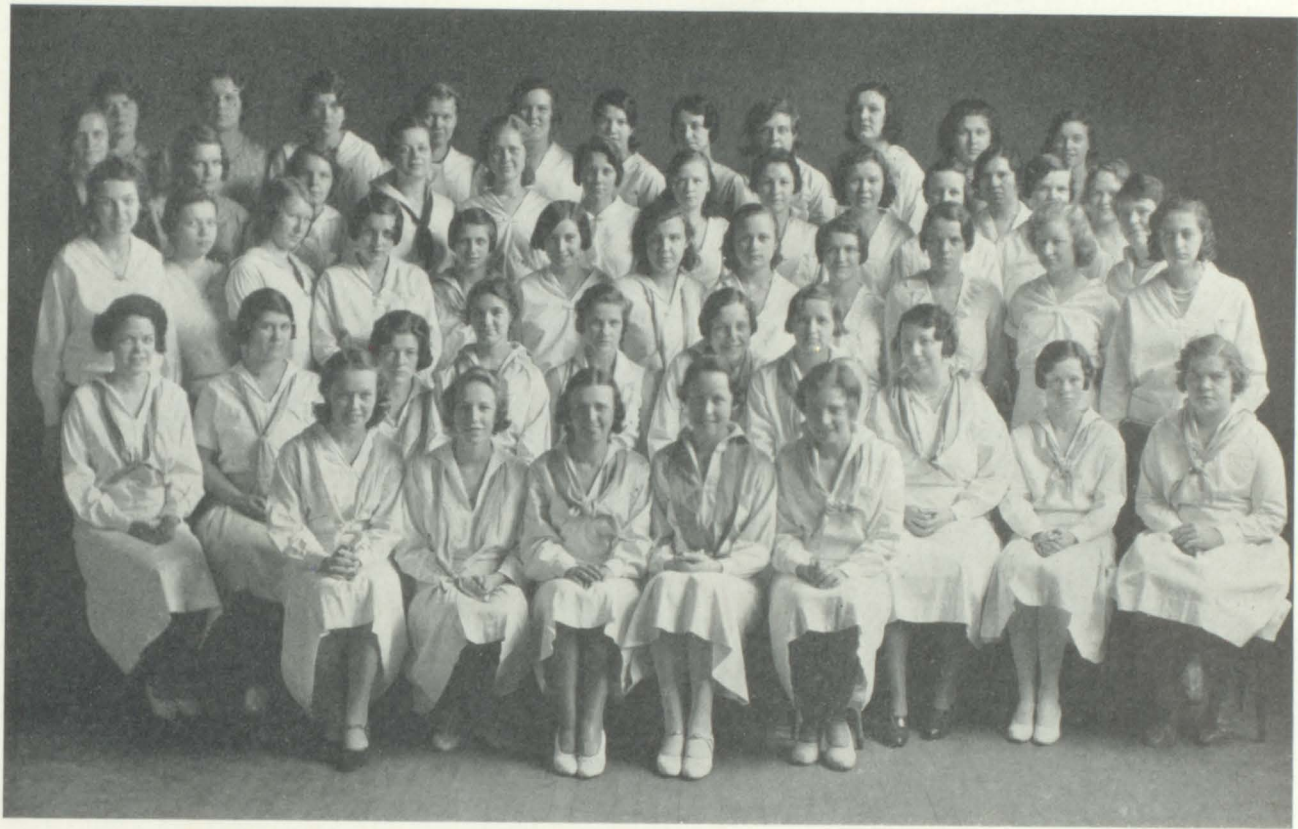
HERE we have the ZENITH STAFF once more. On the top row stands Mr. Sands, the veteran adviser of the ZENITH STAFF for five years.

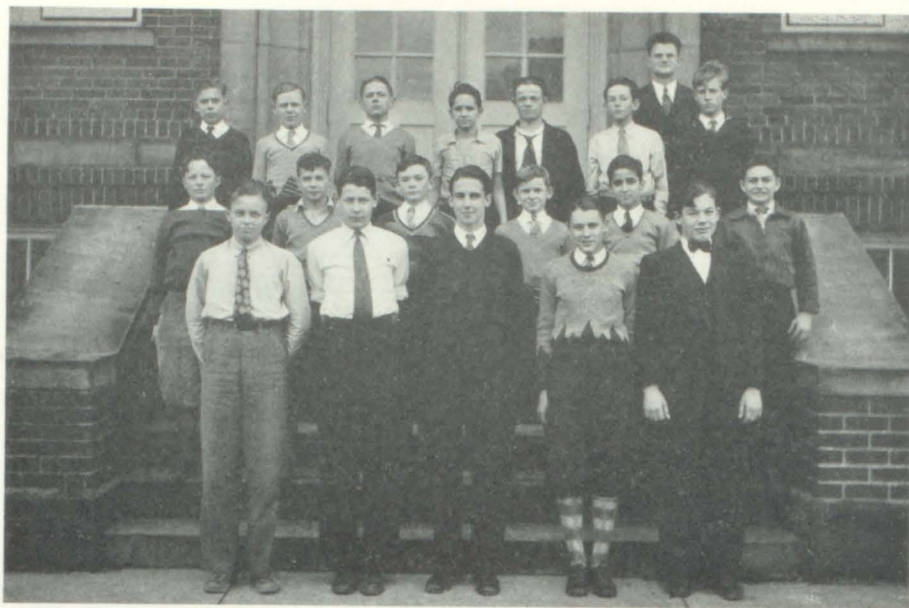
HI-Y CLUB
