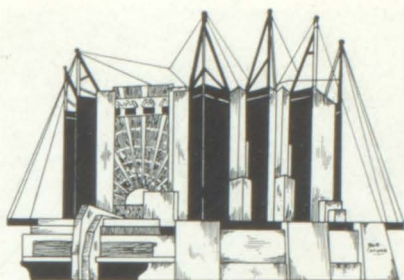

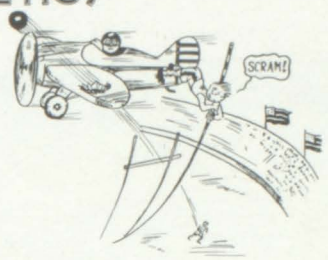
SUMMARY OF THE SEASON

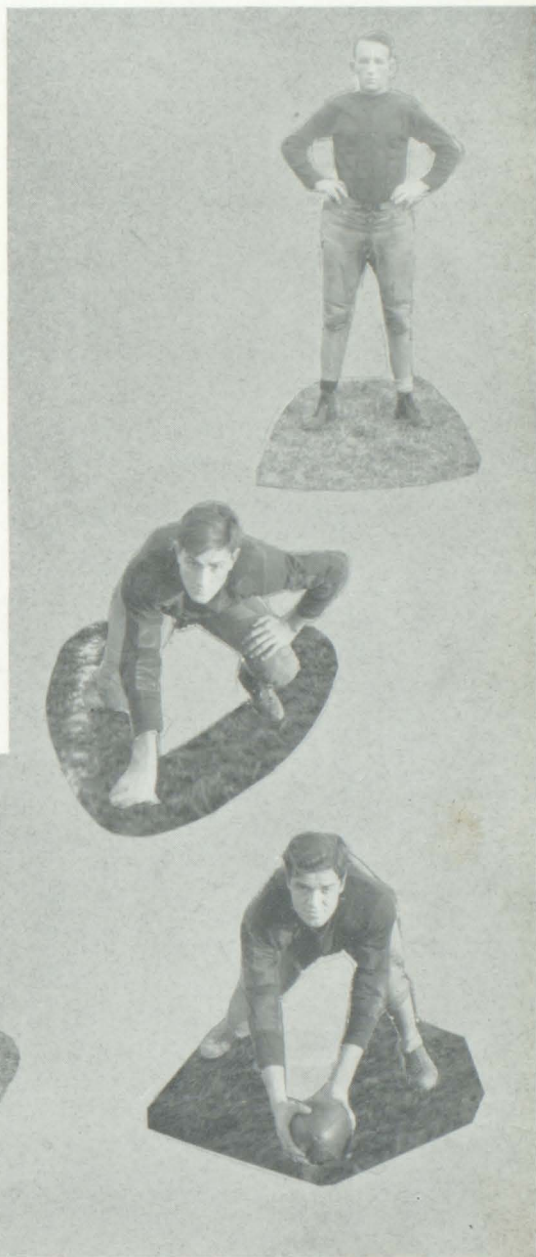

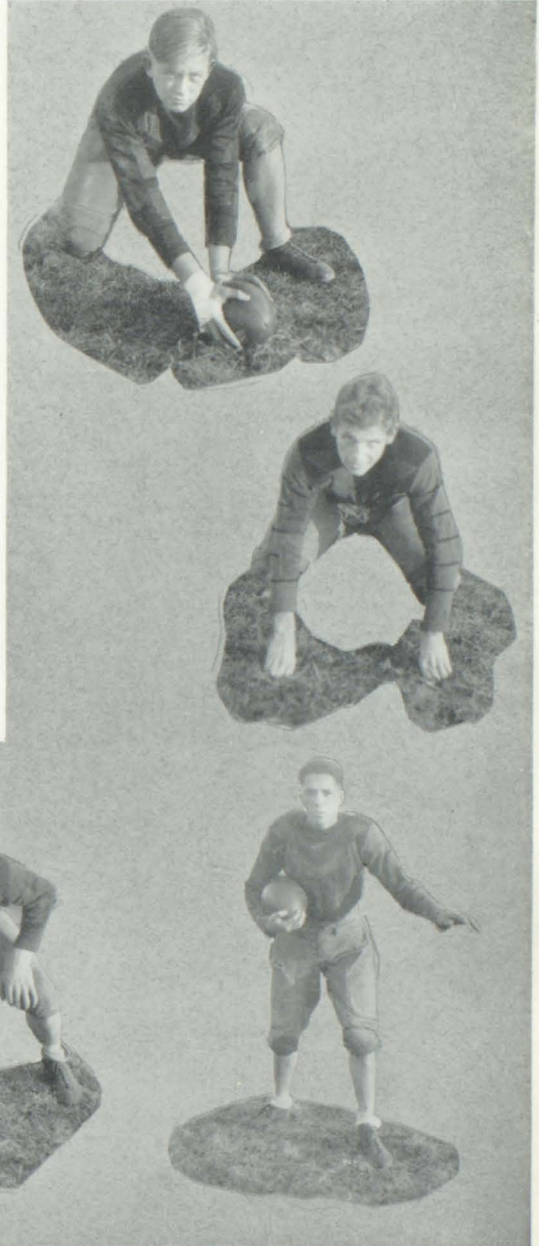

Track, 1932

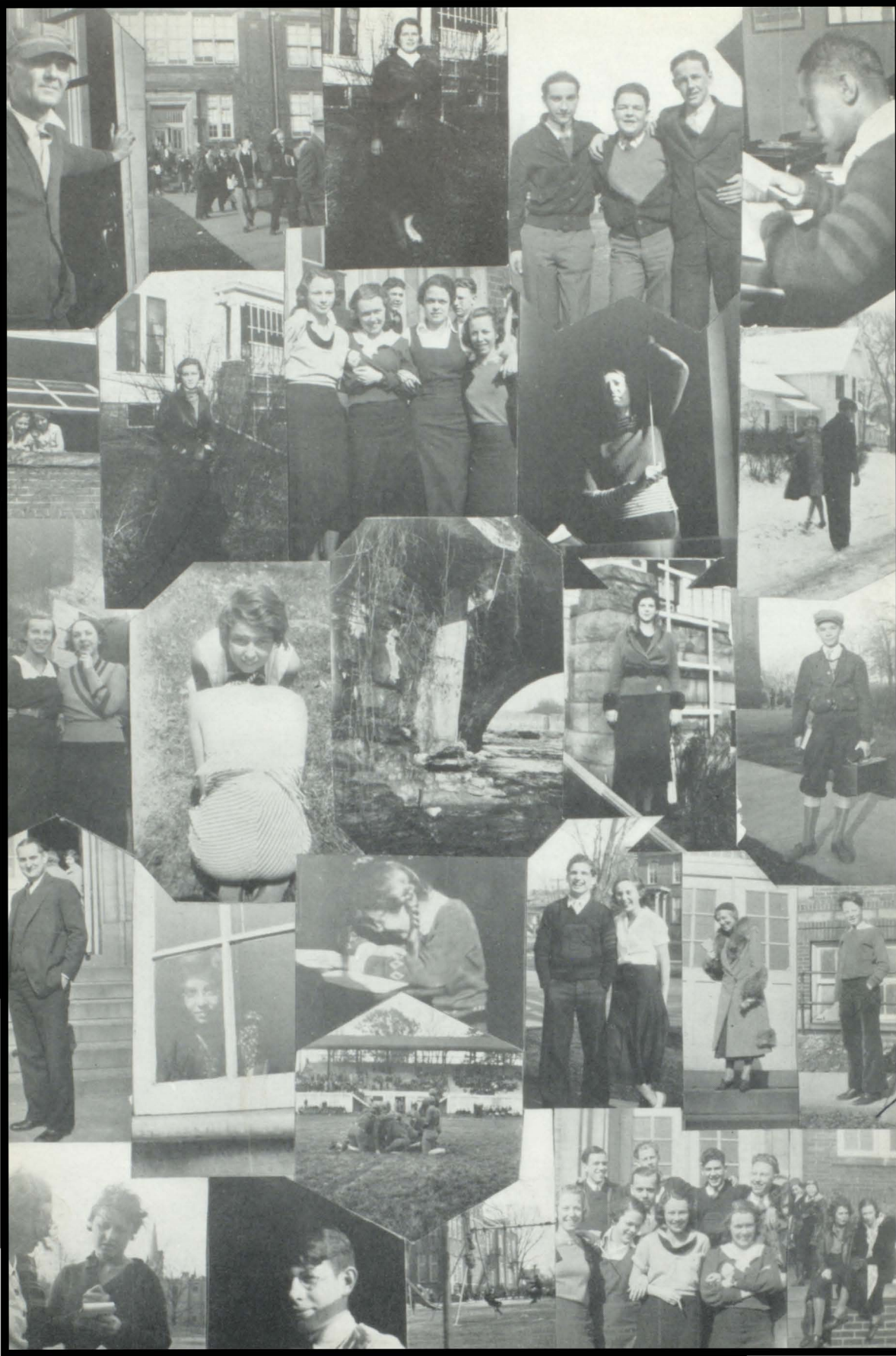

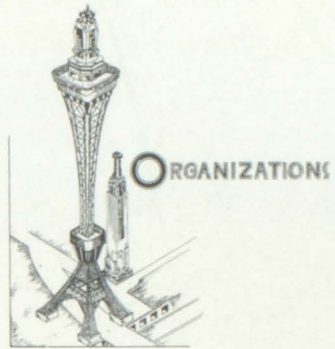

Echo Staff

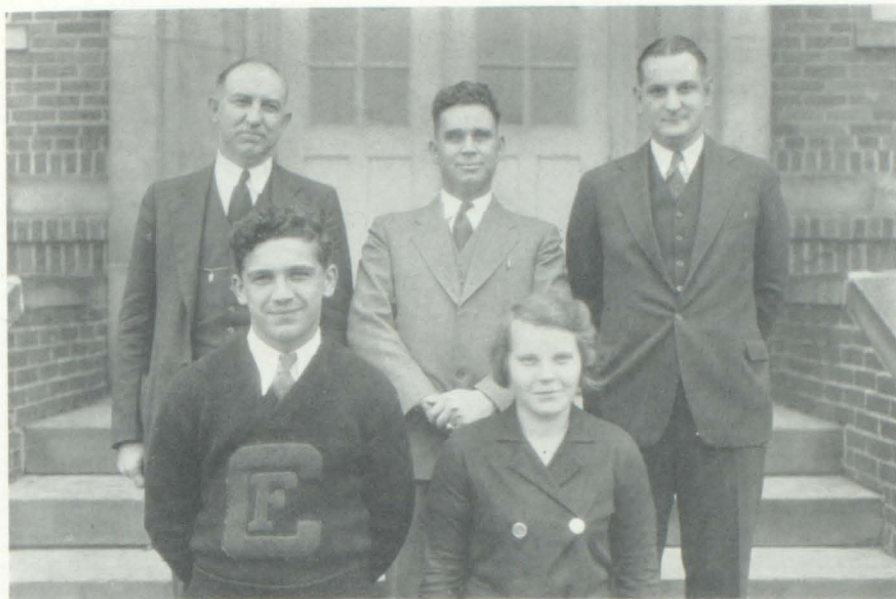
THE "Echo" of this past year was edited informally; that is, not by a regular class, as had been the custom of former years, but by a group of interested students, as an extra-curricular activity.

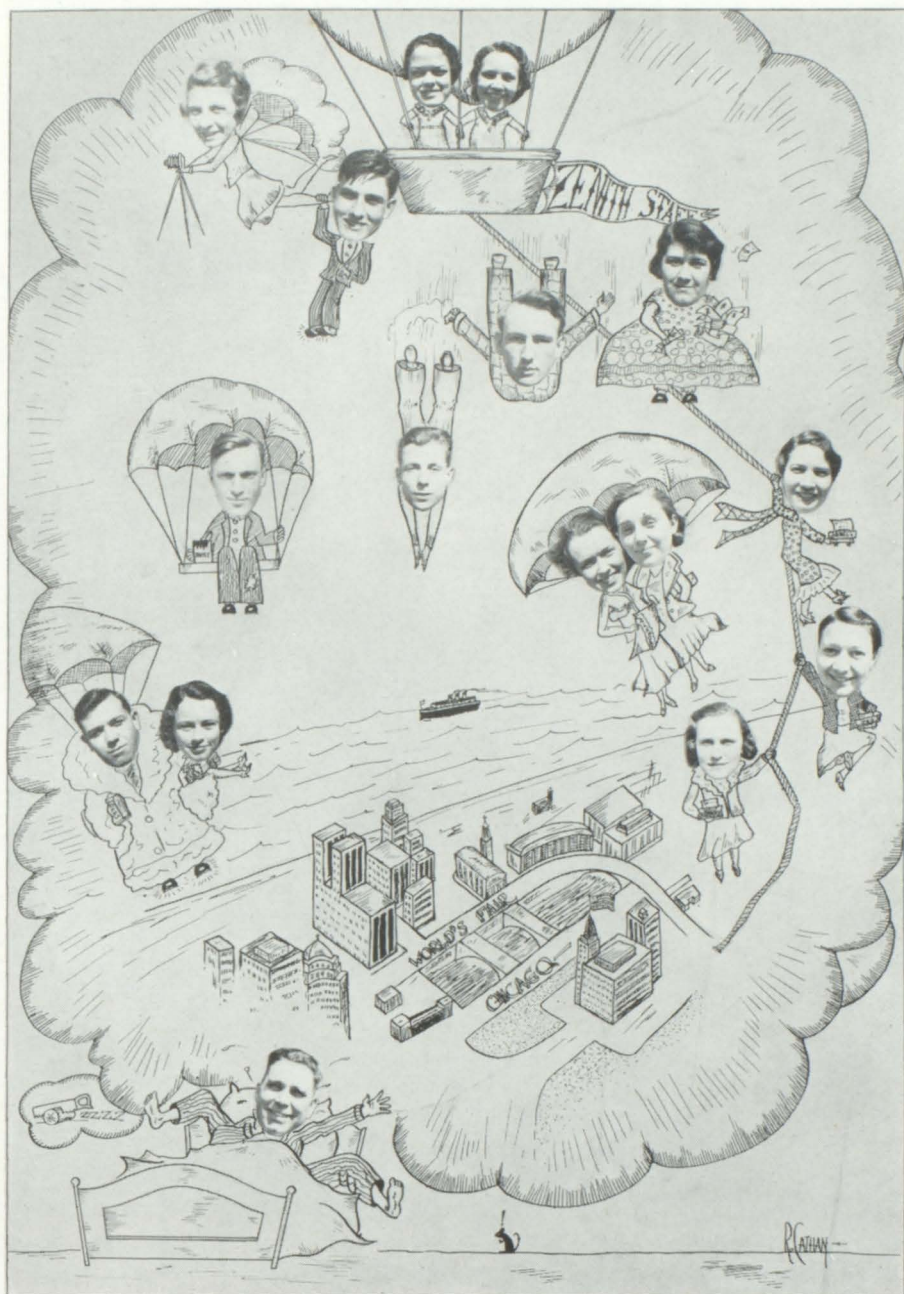

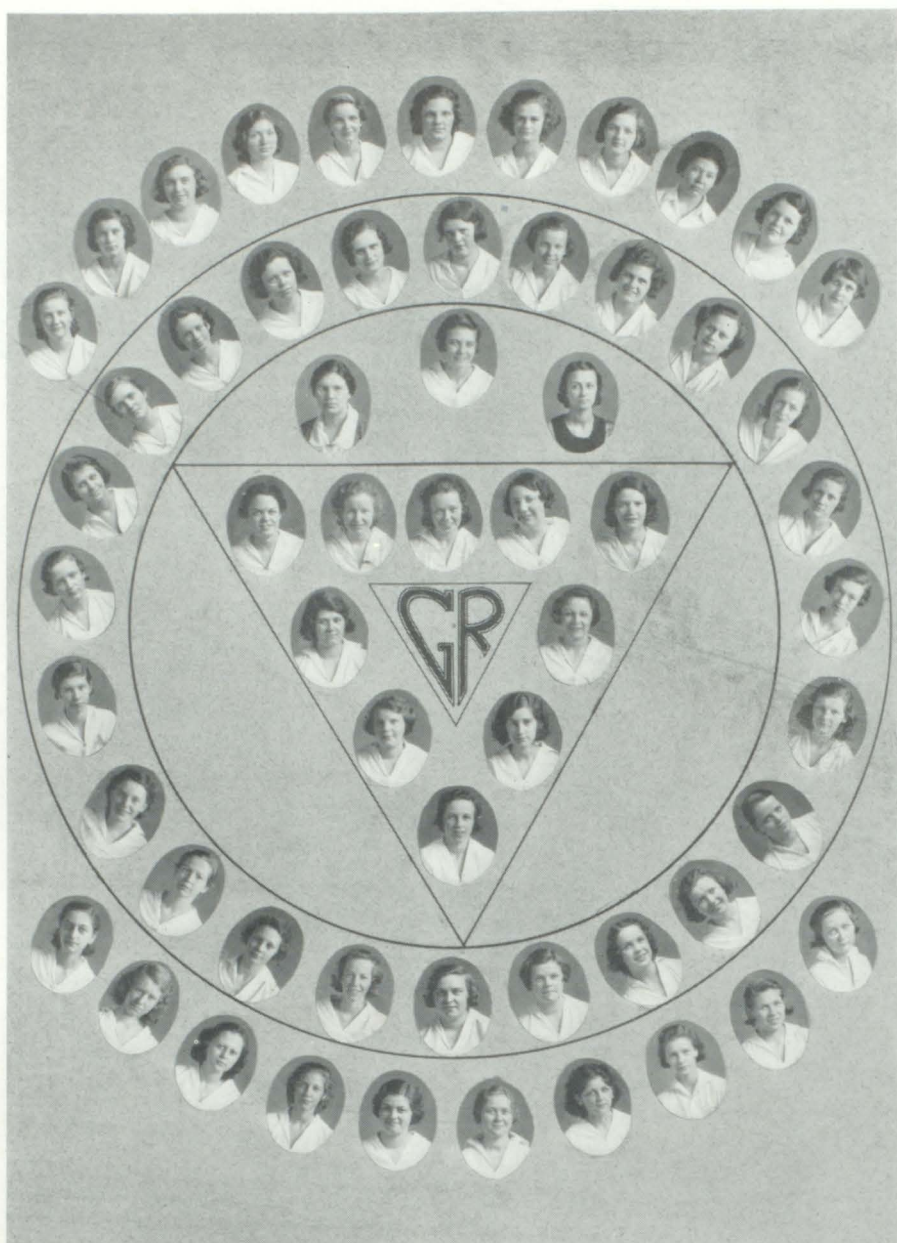

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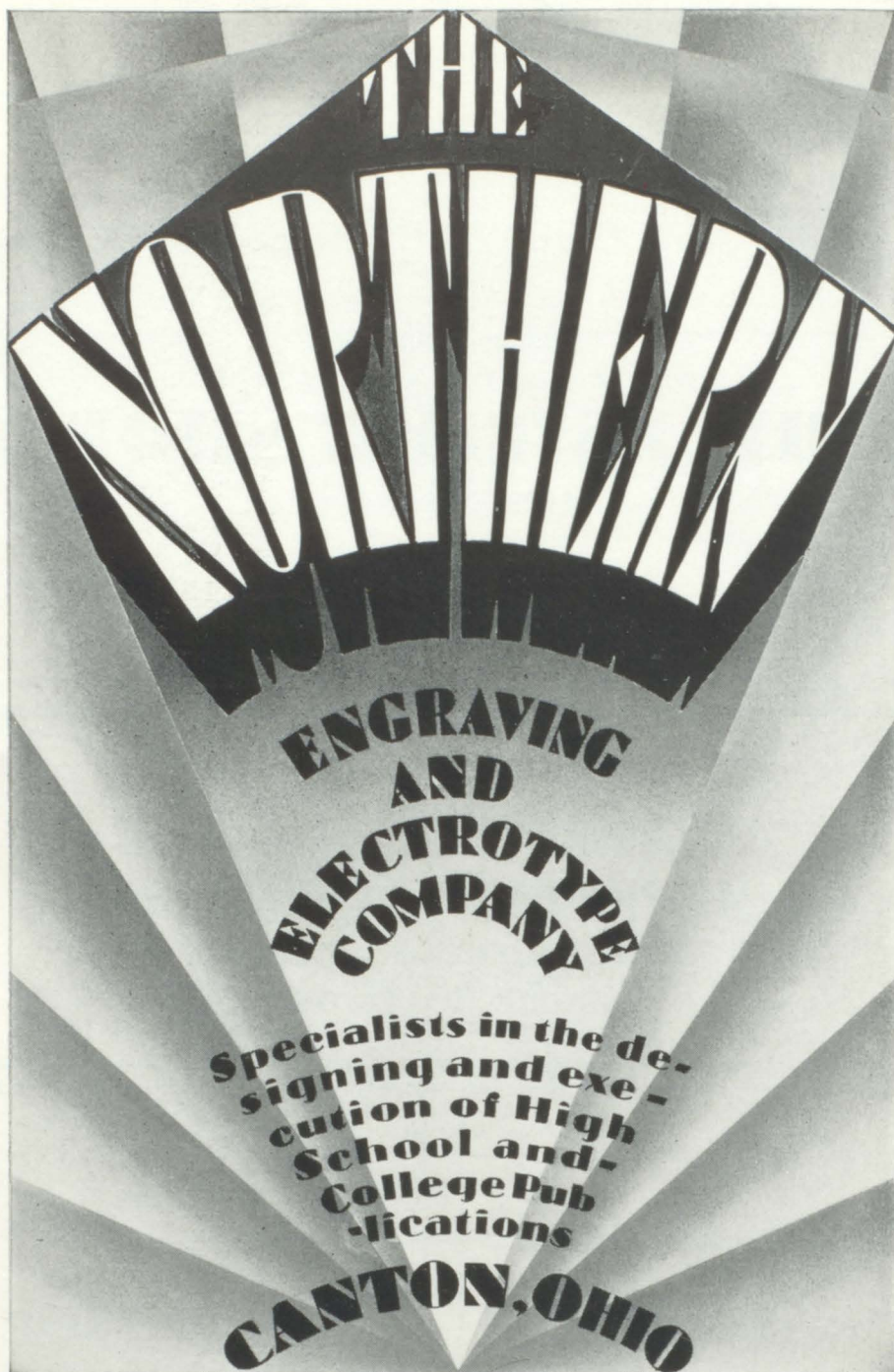
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
