

# Varsity Tiger Wrestlers Lose Two Hope for Third Place in the CVC

Due to the "winter wonderland" of 1977, the Tiger wrestlers battled against just three of their five scheduled Chagrin Valley Conference opponents thus far this season. Two of Chagrin's CVC opponents were the Kenston Bombers, who battled the Tigers in our gym, and Aurora, who defeated Chagrin in Greemen territory. Both teams, the biggest contenders for the CVC crown, defeated Chagrin with overwhelming experience.

Against Kenston, Chagrin managed only one win from junior Bob Jamnik who soundly defeated his challenge at 98 pounds. The referee robbed junior Tom Jicha of a victory by awarding a penalty point for stalling to Bomber Bill Simpson in the final seconds. The very questionable 126-pounders a 3-3 draw. Sophomore Mike Clawson, wrestling up one weight class at 185, also drew with his 6'4" Kenston foe. All of Kenston's six returning seniors won, while Bob Schutte, injured prior to his 119-pound bout, was the only senior in Chagrin's Varsity line-up.

Chagrin's young squad won three bouts against Aurora's stacked line-up which includes seven returning lettermen.

Sophomore Andy Magerupp, presently 2-1 in league competition, pinned Greenman Tim Shaw in the 145-pound match. 167-pound Craig Olsen, also a sophomore, won 10-7 in a see-saw match against Aurora's Pat Connelly. Mike Clawson, who together with Bob Jamnik leads the team with six victories, boasted his CVC mark to 3-0 with a 15-5 major decision over his 175-pound opponent.

Despite these two losses, the Chagrin squad inspired its sparse visiting crowd to stomp, holler, and cheer against the Tigers of Twinsburg. In the meet, which one spectator labeled as, "the most exciting wrestling meet I've ever seen," seven Chagrin Varsity men were triumphant. Sophomore Benjie Himes ignited the initial spark, pinning Evens in the third period of his come-from-behind victory.

Then at 119, Scott Cornelius wrestling for the injured Bob Schutte, handed Dan Jilek with a 6-2 decision. Next in line was sophomore returning letterman Mark Horan. Horan headlocked his Tiger foe and pinned him in less than one minute in his 138 bout. Andy Magerupp, inspired by Horan's pin, defeated D. Marzullo in a close 5-3 decision. Senior Kirk Gebler, supported by the cheers, clapping and general rowdiness of the fans and his teammates, captured a 6-5 decision over Twinsburg's strong captain, Scott Bradley. After Clawson's fall over Chamberlin's M. Wesner, the score

stood 28-27 in favor of Chagrin. Steve Jeffries, spotting 18 pounds at 185, knew he must get at least five team points for Chagrin to ensure at least a 32-32 tie. Jeffries did just that, receiving a 17-3 superior decision putting Chagrin on top 32-27. The Chagrin bench and crowd went hysterical and began clapping and stomping during the heavyweight match. Reed McLellan fired himself and the crowd up, but could not pull off the victory. However, by avoiding the fall, he put the score at 32-30 to give Chagrin the win.

The young Chagrin wrestlers want everyone to know

that they need your support to revitalize the wrestling program at Chagrin and up their record to 7-7 with the four dual meets remaining. In the two previous seasons, Chagrin only won 3 meets all season. This season the Tigers pulled off three victories already and are looking to place third in the CVC. With a lot of crowd participation the Chagrin wrestlers will improve now and in the seasons to come. So come and enjoy an exciting wrestling meet and get involved with the spirited Tiger wrestlers.



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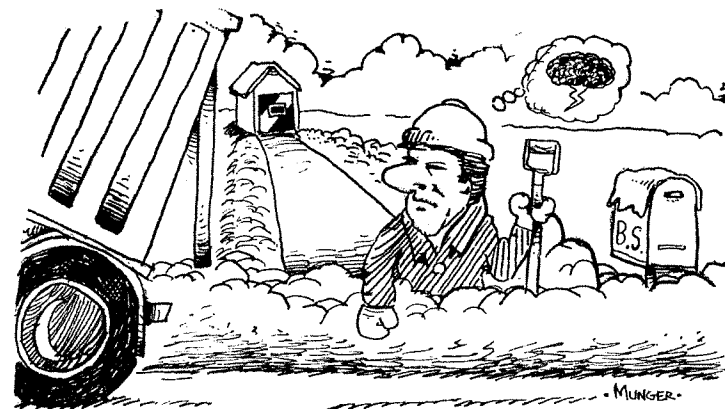

## Students Travel to Forum To Hear Noted Speakers

Chagrin Falls High School students in cooperation with the Cleveland Public Schools will participate this year in a new program called Living Seminars. Through this program three students from each school travel about once a month to the City Club in Cleveland, which is one of the last public forums in the country. Each Friday, it invites a speaker, often of national importance, to address the club members and partici-

pate in a question and answer program. As part of the new program with the schools, the speaker also talks with the high school students.

Upon arriving at the Public Library in Cleveland, the students learn something about the speaker, his topic, and its importance. Then they travel to the City Club across the street and enjoy a buffet luncheon with City Club members. After that, the speaker addresses the Forum and takes the members' questions and then speaks to the students. The entire program is video-taped and recorded for the Cleveland Public Schools. So far this year, Chagrin students have attended three programs. The political editors of the Press and the Plain Dealer discussed the election and Jimmy Carter. Dennis Kucinich, Cleveland clerk of courts, spoke on the importance of Muny Light to Cleveland, and Webster Two Hawk, an Oglala Sioux leader, spoke on "Today's Indian". He stressed the importance of the Indian gaining independence from the government. Many students knew nothing about Indians and Indian rights, and Mr. Two Hawk was a popular speaker.

Students participating in the program are juniors Linda Lampert, Wendy Koepf and Helen Wu; and sophomores Charlie Hartsock and Mike Clawson.

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## Debaters Drive Toward State Finals

The next few weeks represent the crucial stage in the debate season and quite possibly the future of the entire forensic program at Chagrin.

Why? To start off, it will be the point at which a 4-man varsity team is chosen and works together for the first time this year. Barring unforeseen complications, this team will represent Chagrin at districts February 19. Seniors, Tom Moroney and Tom Campbell, the most experienced members, will form the core of any team. The problem, as both coach Len Balk and they see it, is to pick 2 more people from the bevy of newer debaters. Candidates for consideration include promising freshmen Joanne Schultz and Betsy Dellinger, sophomore Carla Harkulich, juniors Brad

Leigh, Jeff Toole, and Scott MacLaren and seniors Rick Freer, Karl Tate and Jim Trolinger.

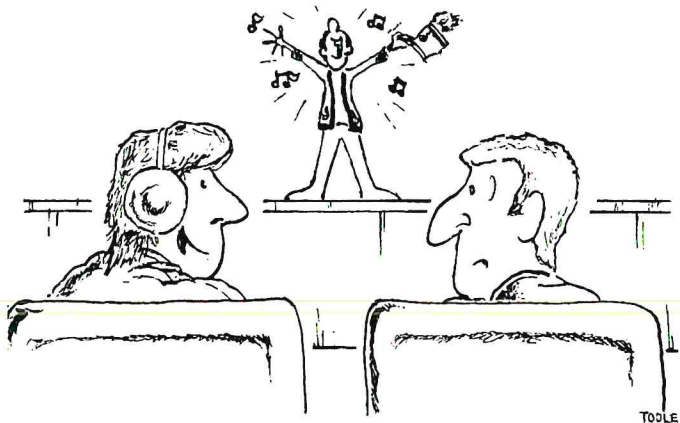
The above list only indicates how desperate the situation is. That's the entire debate club under scrutiny! Realistic pressures do limit the number, however. As it stands, experience and facile grasp of issues fill out the team. Jim Trolinger and Scott MacLaren, respectively, right now are the top choices to join Moroney and Campbell in districts. Jim was on last year's state finalists and Scott appears comfortable with the affirmative side to the debate topic, which he probably will advocate.

In case you were wondering what that topic is, it's "Resolved: that a comprehensive program of penal reform should be adopted throughout the U.S." In debating this the team at all levels has had mixed fortunes. The lower divisions, consisting of Schultz, Dellinger, Harkulich, Leigh, Freer, and at times Trolinger and Tate, have a decent record against Cleveland area competition which they have been in most of the season. Cleveland is not, however, particularly renowned for excellence in debate. Much tougher opponents humiliated them at the Upper Arlington tournament near Columbus.

The section on sources includes directories, bibliographies, indexes and abstracts. Each reference is annotated. The source are based on the Cleveland State library collection.

Topics for research cover employment and higher education issues useful for projects and term papers.

The area of employment is divided in two sections, conditions of employment and implementation of equal employment opportunities.

The higher education section includes a special paper on research and support strategies for women in higher education.

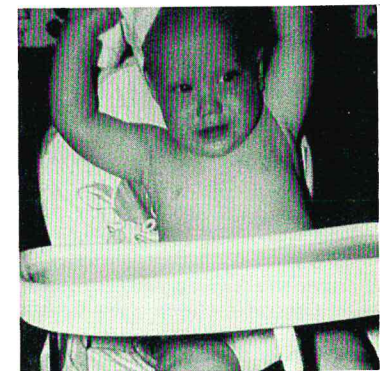

## In the Spotlight

What does one do when one is an AFS student stuck in a Bolivian hospital with a tube in one's arm and a steady supply of liquid is flowing in; and cannot remember how to say "bathroom" in Spanish (due to a memory lapse caused by hepatitis)? Said senior Tom Shields, alias "Bolivia Joe", "I rang for the nurse and made very odd faces at her." One of the highlights of Tom's eleven month stay in Bolivia was, of course, the fact that he came down with hepatitis two months after he arrived. He spent several weeks in the hospital, lost 20 pounds, and experienced what he termed "true loneliness".

But aside from this rather unfortunate mishap, Tom found that living in Bolivia was a "good experience". He lived in La Paz, a city about the size of Youngstown. "It was the biggest city in Bolivia," he claimed. "Everyone lives in cities, there are no such things as suburbs there. Only the Indian lives out in the countryside." Tom has a good chance to observe the countryside, for he took a 24-day winter vacation all over Bolivia with his classmates. About the people he met in Bolivia, Tom noted, "I felt that I was received better by the lower and the lower-middle classes than by the middle and the upper classes. You see, fifty percent of the people are poor Indians, so anyone with a little bit of money automatically 'puts his nose in the air'."

Of course, Tom did not spend all his time traveling. He also went to school after

he recovered from his bout with hepatitis, and he finished in November. School lasted from 8:00 in the morning to 12:30, and there were six school days a week. In July, they were given five weeks of winter vacation. "It was only supposed to be three weeks," explained Tom, "but there were a lot of riots over military service." According to Tom, almost all 18-year-olds must serve a year or two in the military, with no pay.

In La Paz, Tom lived in a two story stucco house with a red tile roof. He never traveled by car, but rather, by bus. "The fare was only 7½ cents," he said.

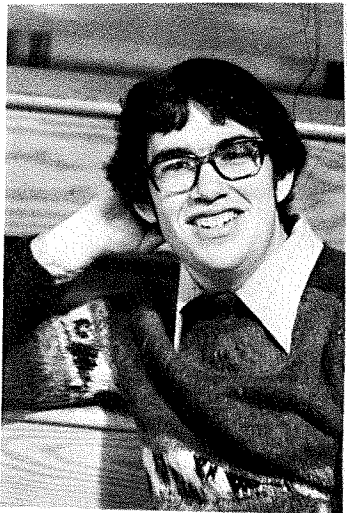
Tom had two sisters, one of whom is an AFS student in Illinois, and a brother who is a year younger than Tom. Of his family, Tom said simply, "I loved them." Then, with a smile, he added, "My father was Portuguese, my mother was a French teacher, my sister spoke English, and every-

one spoke Spanish. Altogether, we spoke four different languages at home!" But, in the beginning, Tom had trouble with just Spanish. During the first month, "I was like a little baby." But during the second and third months, when he was in the hospital, he started communicating, and by the fourth month, he could communicate his ideas. "And by the sixth month," he said, "I could talk!"

One of the differences between Bolivia and the United States is that Bolivia has what Tom calls "free controlled capitalism." He explained, "The natural resources are nationalized." Another difference is the warm balmy Bolivian weather. Glancing out the window, Tom remarked rather wistfully, "It would reach sixty-five degrees in the winter during the day."

"Altogether," concluded Tom, "I don't think I had any experiences which really had a profound impact on my life. It

was nice to get the chance to take the year off to learn about myself by getting away from this environment and experiencing another culture, though." He laughed, and added, "todavia tengo que ir al baño!"



## A Star Shines for Streisand

A *Star Is Born* happens to be one of the better films released recently. This love story set in the rock world has a bitter caustic taste. Its entirety is marvelously entertaining and it's certainly not the unmitigated disaster many critics have acclaimed it. Critics tend to get awfully prickly (or is it prickly) when confronted with a remake of a love story. They use archaic standards, and the least sign of emotion they denounce as sentimentality. Then when they run out of intelligent critical energy, they begin to debate the length of Barbra Streisand's nostrils.

Indeed, Barbra Streisand's performance is actually very commendable and thankfully non-ethnic, a saving grace. But now a boring plot summary. Kris Kristofferson plays a hyper-macho cocaine-sniffing rock star, John Norman Howard, who is becoming decidedly apathetic about performing. Hence his career is

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on the slide. He comes across Barbra Streisand singing in a cafe. They get together and fall in love. Streisand's character particularly has a hard but soft personality, and she plays her rather kooky self at times, but it seems very normal.

The falling rock star then gives the singer in the cafe her first big break and suddenly Esther Hoffman is famous. Kristofferson is cut out of his old group and becomes depressed. He seems irked by the situation and goes to bed with another girl. This scene is not consistent with the previous action. Esther and Howard, however, get back together and then tragedy strikes.

Despite Streisand, Kristofferson still steals the show. His wild stunts like riding motorcycles on stage to shooting at helicopters are perfectly played off against his quiet introspective knowledge that he is destroying himself.

Every other aspect of this film works well also. Frank Pierson, winner of an Academy Award for his screenplay of *Dog Day Afternoon* debuts as a director and pulls few tricks keeping the direction interesting but realistic. The script is a fine original updating of the aged *A Star Is Born*. And the soundtrack, mostly by Paul Williams, is particularly good. The music is a key to their lines and the script uses it well to illustrate their conflicts.

All these fine ingredients to in to concoct one very arresting movie. Only one criticism, the film should've clarified the origin of John Norman Howard's self-destruction. He is such a multi-dimensional character that it's unfortunate that one is only allowed to guess at his past. *A Star Is Born* also gives us an interesting glimpse into the nihilistic rock world. And with its fine performances and professional mounting, it comes across as excellent entertainment.
