

Ten Tigers Tracksters Travel

Despite two days of incessant rain, the boys track team shined at the Independence Sectionals. The Tigers accumulated sixty-two points to finish third behind Warrensville and Benedictine.

The high point of the two day meet was Gregg Greenough's first place finish in the two mile. Greenough stopped the clock at 10:06.6 for a personal record and the third best time in CFHS history.

The only other first place finish went to Scott Miller in the Pole Vault. Miller tried three unsuccessful attempts at 13', but settled for first with a 12'6" vault. John Bartley will also travel to Districts with a fourth place finish of 12'.

In the other field event action, Tim Richey managed a leap of 5'10" to earn a second place in the high jump. Doug Murry also earned a trip to Akron with a fourth place heave in the shot put.

Walt Weber took on a field of thirty hurdlers and sped through the 120 high hurdles to a second place finish.

The half mile was one of the more exciting races of the day. Jim Lynch really poured it on for the last lap and narrowly missed beating two Benedictine runners to the tape. He did, however, break the two minute barrier with a 1:59 clocking.

The mile relay will be the only relay team to travel to

Districts. Jeff Baker, Tom Jicha, Bob Norwick and Lynch ran what they thought was a disappointing fifth place finish. Kenston was then disqualified from the event, which moved the Tigers up to fourth.

So the Tigers will be sending a team of ten individuals down to Akron for the District track meet. If anyone is fortunate enough to finish in the top four there, they'll be making the trip down to Columbus for the State meet.

The Chagrin Falls High School varsity tennis team went to Sectionals, May 11th, at Euclid, where they competed with 12 other schools.

Chagrin team members, Chip Wiper and Mike Rabin, seeded third in the doubles competition, and Jim Meyer in singles, survived the first day's matches and won the right to compete on the second day, May 12th. All three players, however, were defeated on the second day of the tournament.

The Tigers started off the month of May with two victories. The first win, against Gil-mour, May 1st, saw Chip Wiper winning first singles,

Jim Meyer, third singles, Dave Alpeter and Jack Campbell, first doubles and Jim Baker and J. B. Raftus, second doubles. On May 2nd, the CFHS team shut out West Geauga, 5-0.

The Tigers participated in the Chagrin Valley League Meet on April 29th. At this meet, all team members survived the first round and four Chagrin participants advanced to the finals competition. They were: Mike Rabin, second singles, Jim Meyer, third singles, and Peter Herr and Jim Baker at second doubles. Mike Rabin won the tournament at second singles.

Aurora, with 21 points, captured the league title. Orange and Chagrin each with 18 points, tied for second place in the league. In order to break the tie, on May 15th, the two teams had a play off match for the second place standing.

A few of the current individual records are: Jim Baker, second doubles, (10-1); Peter Herr, second doubles, (8-0); Mike Rabin, second singles, (9-2). All of the remaining varsity players also have winning records.

"The biggest strength of our team is our depth. Everyone is back from last year. We have eight strong players," remarked the Tiger Coach, Mr. Bob Furst.

The CFHS varsity Tigers are currently 3-1 in the league and 7-4 overall.

Wings Washed Up

Now don't get me wrong, Wings is one of my favorite groups, but I'm about to give their new album "London Town" a not-so-good review. I'm now convinced that the trend towards washed out pop music that Paul McCartney started with his "Speed of Sound" album is being completed.

"London Town" is filled with simple melodies and even simpler lyrics. None of the songs really distinguished themselves from each other except for the title cut and "With a Little Luck." These are both top 40 type songs which are almost too sweet and innocent to enjoy. Most of the lyrics are child-like and fairly tale-ish, much the same as some old Beatle songs. However, they lack that haunting edge the Beatles had that made you think that there was some deep, underlying meaning.

Of course, no album with Paul McCartney on it can be completely bad, and "London Town" is no exception. The LP has one solid McCartney ballad called "I'm Carrying" which brings back memories of "Blackbird" and "Yester-

day". Paul sings a solo on this song and he is accompanied only by his guitar and an orchestrated overdub. The only other strong point is a lively rocker called "I've Had Enough". It's unfortunate that the album doesn't contain more songs like this.

Throughout the album, I was waiting for the band to rip into a "Venue and Mars" or a "Band on The Run" type cut that would stand out from the rest. But that song never came and I think that is where the problem exists. So, if you enjoy sterile pop music, buy this album, and if you don't enjoy it, forget it because your parents might already have it.

Graduation for the seniors will be on June 5 at 8:00 in Harris Stadium. The AFS students and the valedictorian, Helen Wu, will speak, along

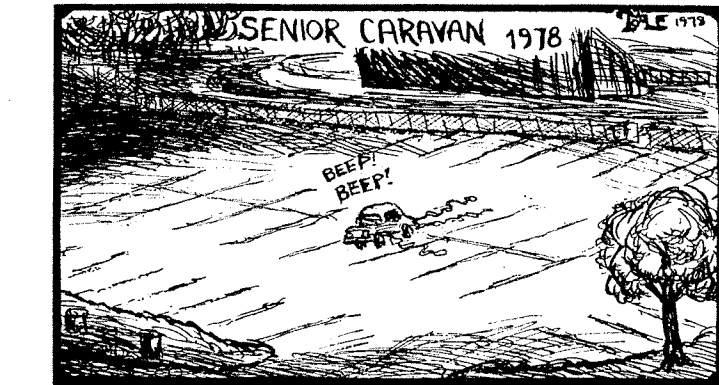
with several speakers the class has chosen.

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Career Column

Do you feel shaky about going on interviews for that summer or full-time job? There are six important steps to a successful interview, says Richard McClintock, president of ITT Educational Services, Inc. The ITTES tips are:

1. **Study the company** by visiting the library and asking for background information, such as an annual report or other company literature. During the interview, ask several questions based on your research to show the interviewer you took the time to find out about the company.

2. **Know the company's location** and allow adequate time to get there.

3. **Dress neatly**, women in dresses or skirts and men in suits.

4. **Be confident**. Greet the interviewer with a firm handshake, smile and look him or

her right in the eye. Have the attitude that you are the best-qualified person for the job.

5. **Be prepared for questions**. Bring a resume, list of references (including addresses) and other pertinent information. Expect such questions as: Why do you think you are qualified? Do you have health problems? Why are you seeking the job? Will you work overtime? What is your education? Do you have any specialized training?

6. **Know your salary range** and the range for this type of work. If salary doesn't come up in the interview, don't mention it. The company may want to check references and schedule another interview.

"Before leaving, ask permission to call back in several days to find out the results," McClintock says. "If the call doesn't pay out, thank the interviewer and ask to be kept in mind for future openings."

Television of the 1990's will consist mainly of Beverly Hillbillies reruns and risqué French movies. The average

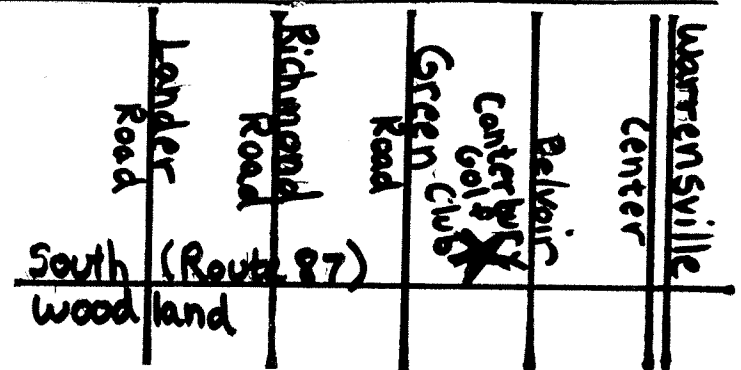
