Chagrin Falls High School will have their first Girls' Tennis Team this fall, according to coach Carolyn Hanson.

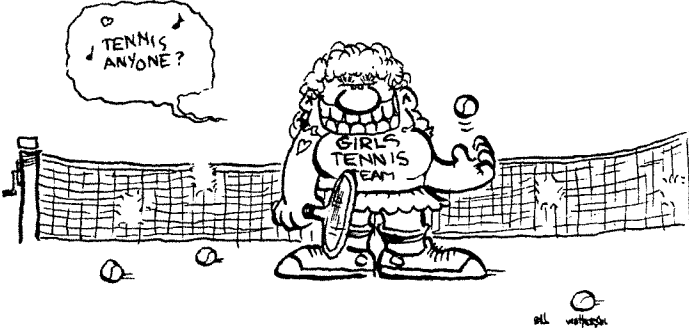

Mrs. Hanson concluded, "There are great possibilities for this fall--some good tennis players who are really interested in playing their best should make a solid team with a good first season."

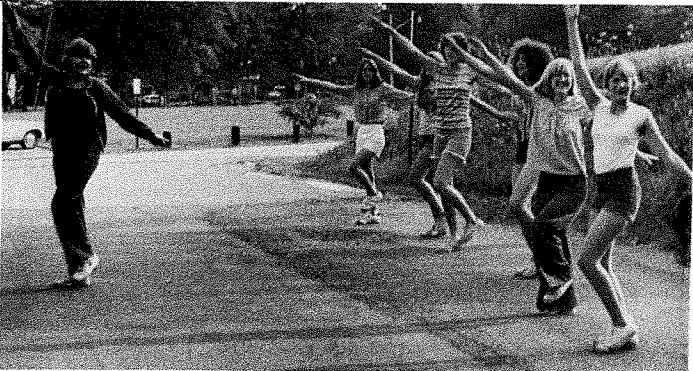

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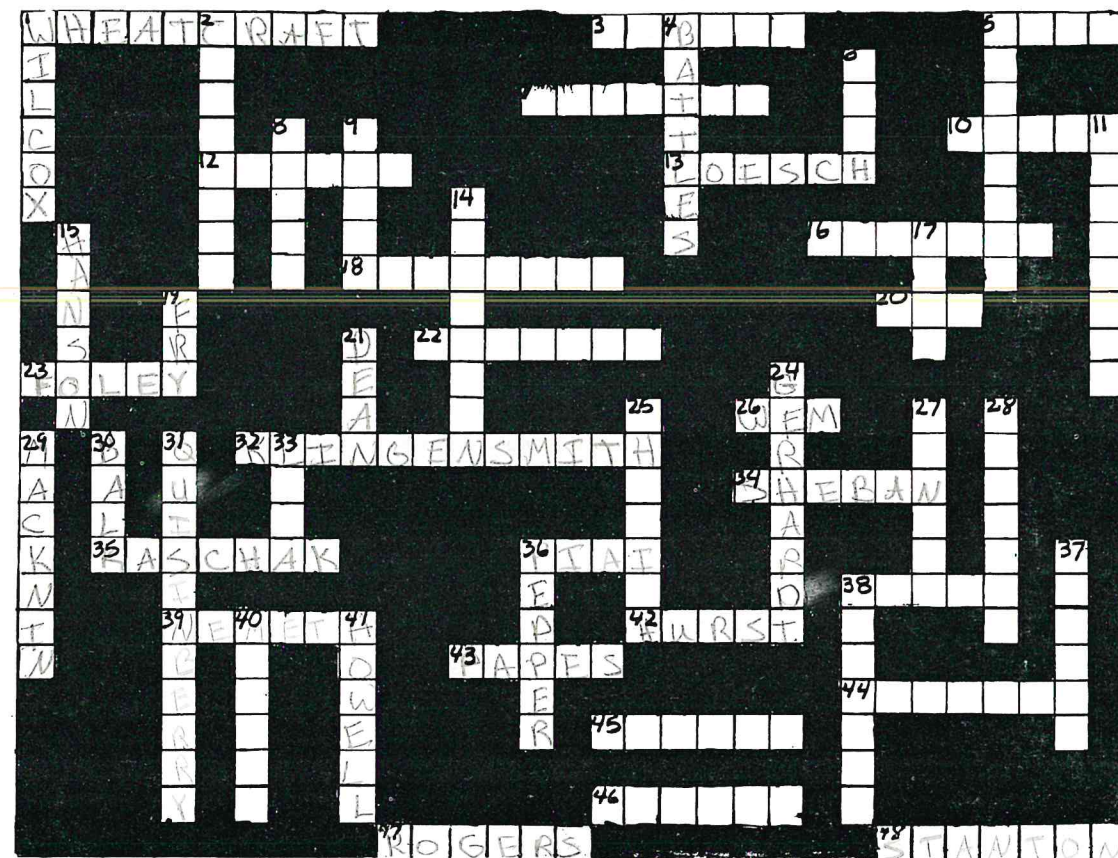

Murder. The Ultimate Farce?

Murder by Death is a witty farce in which six of the world's greatest fictitious detectives are gathered under one Gothic roof to solve a murder that hasn't been committed. Their host (shakily played by Truman Capote), clad in a fur coat, pink sun glasses, and smoking a lavender cigarette, called them together for the only purpose; it seems sometimes, of throwing out one-liners.

In the style of his **Odd Couple**, Neil Simon writes a script around single-line gags. But, unlike **'Couple'**, Simon's plot in **Murder** is too sketchy. One dead body disappears completely from the plot. In fact, the 'plot' is so perfunctory (look *that* up in

your Funk & Wagnalls) that it seems like a distraction.

At any rate, the characterizations are superb. David Niven and Maggie Smith do exceptional as the Nick and Nora Charles-type, persistent in their cocktail repartee even after one of them was stung by a scorpion. Peter Sellers plays a Charlie Chan figure, poking fun at both Chan's fondness for stupid sayings and his exploitation of his children. Elsa Lancaster as

Miss Marbles was not as curious, because the character she mocks, Jean Marple, has no idiosyncrasy to exploit. James Coco is mediocre as a take-off of Hercule Poirot, but his mocking of Poirot's love for food is worth having the character in the movie.

The best bit of acting was done by Peter Falk who plays upon Sam Spade's hatred of women, always brushing off

his personal secretary, Eileen Brennan. "I'm scared, Sam," says Brennan, "hold me." "Hold yourself. I'm busy." Falk plays his part of the farce so well, you almost believe Humphrey Bogart himself is in the movie, making fun of his most famous character.

One of the most funniest scenes in **Murder** is the confrontation between the blind butler, Alec Guinness, and the deaf and dumb cook, Nancy Walker. Since neither can communicate with each other, the dinner does not go on, leaving the guests wondering where the food is, rather than whodunit.

The ending of **Murder** is good in that there are eight (yes, count 'em) surprise endings. So, who did it? Was it the butler, the cook, or some other person left unaccounted for (like the missing corpse)? Find out for yourself. I give **Murder by Death** four stars.

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
