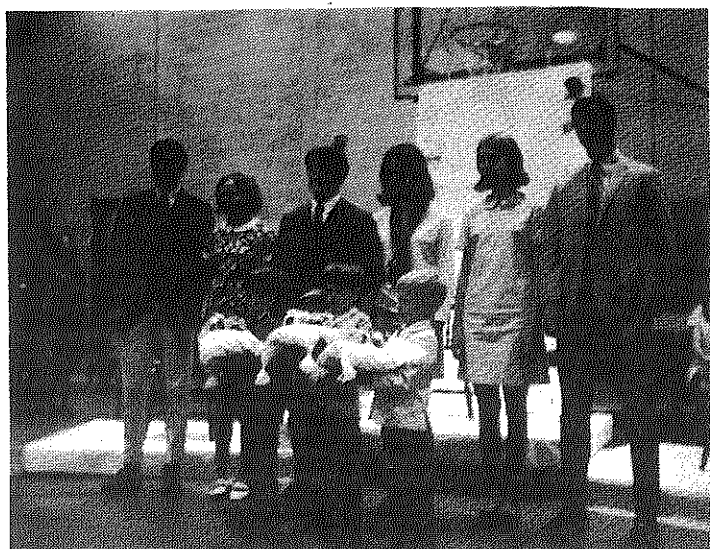

Mr. Dale Richmond's senior civics classes have been conducting a Model Congress for the past few weeks. The four classes were split into two Senates and two Houses of Representatives.

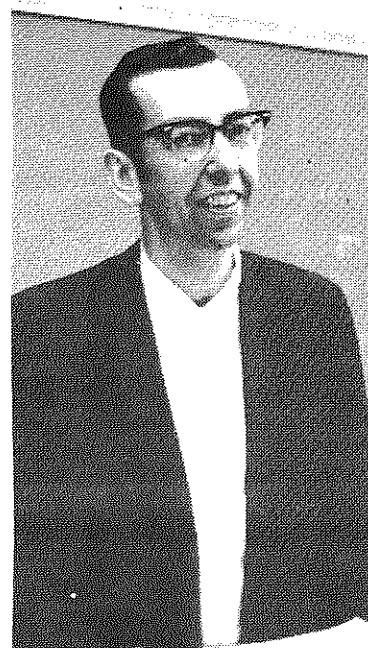
Major objectives for seniors were to develop skill in their ability to think critically about vital issues, to become more aware of our American legislative process, and to provide experience in speaking before a group.

Probably the most difficult objective to reach was that of learning to work with and get along

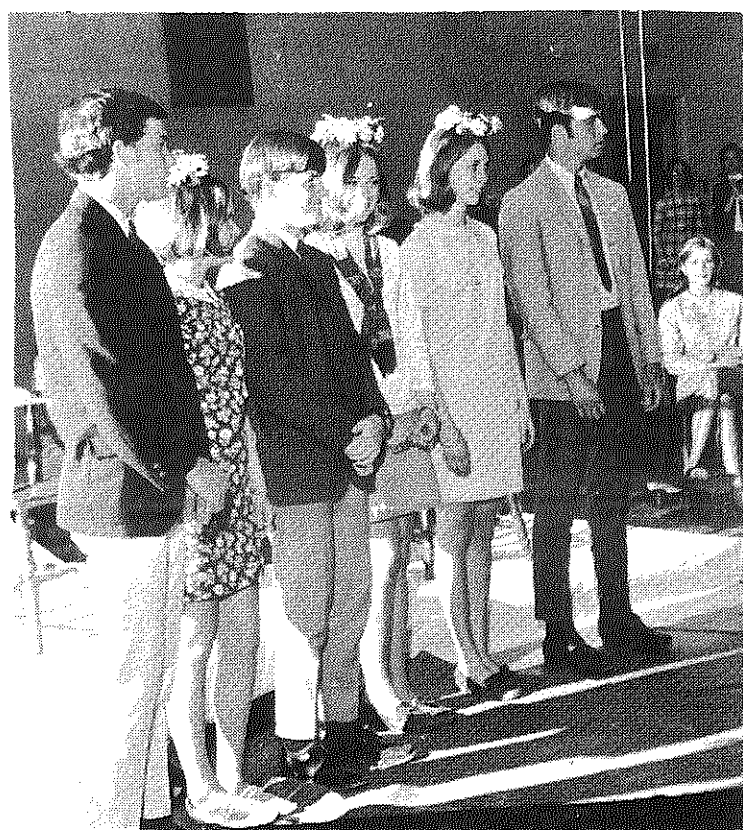
with others in one's group on the opposing side. Also one had to be alert to all current news that concerned his bill.

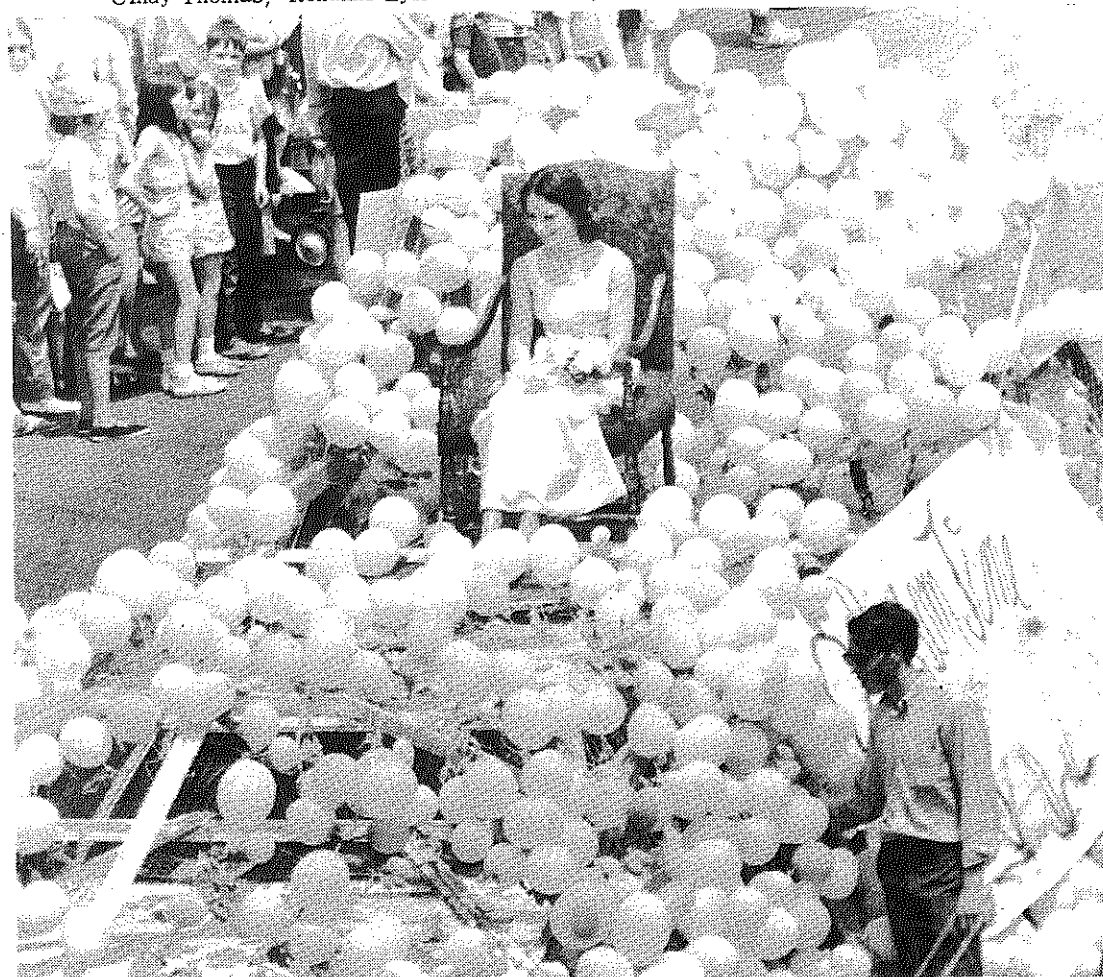
Science Changes

Even though Mr. Neal Wheatcraft is one of our busiest faculty members, he found time for an interview concerning his department. Between interruptions by a chemical salesman, students, and other teachers, he named several changes to come.

Having served as department head for ten of his eighteen years in Chagrin, Mr. Wheatcraft is looking forward to changes such as the expanded facilities: the new dark room, the lab for advanced biology, physics, and earth science, and to the physical science course that will be introduced next year.

He feels that replacement of present courses in general chemistry and traditional senior physics by the new laboratory-oriented physical science course will tie in with the increasing emphasis on vocational education in the valley schools.

Hypocrates at Home

Dear editor,

The time was 3rd period, May 20th. The place was CFHS gymnasium. The bleachers were occupied by the freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors. Teachers were in attendance, either standing at the balcony railings or sitting in the first row of the bleachers. Down on the floor, risers and folding chairs accommodated our school band and choir. These two musical groups presented the same program which had delighted me at Friday night's pop concert. But this assembly brought me nothing but embarrassment and bitter feelings of frustration and indignation.

The reason for my embarrassment is clear to anyone who was present at that assembly. Students kept up their general conversations throughout the entire program, evidently unconcerned and unmindful of the performers' efforts and feelings. Perhaps some cared, but not enough to eliminate the ten or twelve comments to their neighbors. Besides being unspeakably rude, these students didn't realize what they missed by not listening. The selections from the musicals "Oliver" and "Carousel," "Dixieland Jazz," and "If I Loved You" comprised the best concert that we've ever witnessed.

It infuriates me that students don't appreciate the level of excellence our band has reached. Memories must be short in regard to the time our band was composed of sixteen members. Our band has grown from that point, not only to adequate size and sound, but of superior quality. Perhaps in those early years, one would clap only because he felt the obligation. But this sense of duty doesn't even enter into the picture today. The band is truly deserving of applause.

However, students were just as unappreciative of the choir's efforts. I realize that listening to a concert may not be everyone's chief ambition, but the per-

formers deserve our respect. This courtesy should be given and not have to be asked for. Students sometimes ask why Chagrins doesn't have more assemblies with outside speakers or performers. I believe that our last assembly made the answers completely obvious.

CFHS students are demanding more freedoms and more privileges. One prerequisite for freedom and privilege is that students show responsibility to deserve them. This assembly was a perfect example of how immaturely some students react without some disciplining force sitting right next to them. We as students certainly picked a poor way to prove that our level of independence justifies new freedoms.

Mr. William Foley and Mrs. Macin have made it clear that they do not wish to perform in this situation again. This is not a threat, just a clear statement of fact. It doesn't make much sense for them to continue unappreciated, does it? Regrettably, it is we students who miss out in the final analysis.

The majority of critics of the assembly believe that the poor attention is due to the fact that all assemblies are mandatory. I admit that there are many reasons for the lack of attention, but they can only be regarded as excuses. The basic question is a matter of self-discipline - whether you have the presence of mind to behave favorably when the conditions may be unfavorable.

Is respect too much to expect from CFHS'ers? And how will the next assembly of this nature turn out? I would hope that some strong student pressure will be applied to the minority who chose to disrupt the program, that the responsible students will not condone the actions of the irresponsible ones.

Tony Says 'Ate a Vista, Chagrins'

How would you like to go to school for just five hours during the day and still have a choice of going in the morning, afternoon, or at night? That is the way the school system in Brazil works. There are no study halls, and we have five classes of 50 minutes each, with a break of ten minutes between classes for us to talk with our friends.

Many people ask what we do during the rest of the day. After school is over, we have physical education three times a week. We get out at ten after twelve and have lunch at home, then go back to school in the afternoon for gym. We do all our homework at home.

Our school year starts in March and lasts until December. In July we have the whole month of vacation for resting from the work done during the first semester. Our summer vacation is in December, January, and February.

Almost every weekend we have dances at social clubs, where we meet our friends from high school. Also country clubs are the place where we usually go with friends on Sunday afternoons.

Soccer is the most popular sport in Brazil, and in Rio de Janeiro we have the biggest soc-

cer stadium in the world, with a capacity for 200,000 people. Brazil was the world champion twice in a row, in 1958 and 1962.

Brazilians are very affectionate people who show their feelings and enjoy good songs, such as the Brazilian popular music played by the Brazilian group Sergio Mendes and Brazil 66, which is known in the United States. We like dances, and there is a time of the year, in February, when we have festivities all over the country in the four days before Ash Wednesday. Those festivities are called "Carnival." The clubs are colorfully decorated, and the songs played during the dancing are pretty fast and the words are satirical.

Brazil is much like the United States, because when it was discovered by the Portuguese in the 1500's, there were primarily Indians living in it. Later on, the immigrants from Europe started moving to the immense land once inhabited by the Indians. But they didn't go farther west, living more around the coast; and as a consequence, still in the modern days there are parts of the country like in the Northwest and Far-West, where there is a small number of people in comparison with other states.

With an area as large as the United States, the population of Brazil is not as large, with 95,000,000 people. We have 22 states, four territories, and one Federal District where the new capital of Brazil, Brasilia, was inaugurated in 1960. The idea of building Brasilia in the middle of the country was to take the people away from the coast, where the biggest cities are located.

When you travel on the roads you don't see small towns close together like here, but you see bigger cities farther apart. The tall lines of the skyscrapers are a constant view in the fast-growing cities in Brazil.

Art is appreciated in Brazil on a large scale, and there are a great number of artists in different branches, such as painting, sculpture, drawing, and architecture.

Brazil is an immense land with a huge number of natural resources which have been explored highly by the actual government. I believe that all these facts and its geographic conditions will undoubtedly turn Brazil into a power in the following years.

Kim Says Goodbye

"Kim, you are leaving pretty soon aren't you? Aren't you looking forward to going home?" These were the questions mostly asked of me in recent weeks. And they reminded me that my AFS year here in Chagrins is almost over - didn't I just arrive? It is unbelievable how fast the time went, and I'm afraid that the last few weeks will go even faster than I would like them to.

When I first came here - just a week ago!! - I didn't know anybody. I have to admit that I was homesick at the beginning, just because I was missing all my friends and folks at home. But the warmth shown of all of you helped me to get over it, and now I know just about everybody.

Now that I am almost leaving, there's so much to say that it's very hard to put into words. There were a lot of things similar to home, but of course there were quite a lot of differences between my home and Chagrins. Just think of humidity or my white socks, or the thing with the restricted beer - and I even got used to French toast, which was almost impossible to eat at the beginning - you can see how one can go down the drain!

Let me say this - at the beginning comparisons are very easy to make, but usually they aren't right. You only see the surface of an object at first. This was a thing I learned, and now that I have been here for a longer time, I look at things from your point of view - but still with my own eyes. I even

look at things back home with different eyes. This is what AFS tries to promote: understanding and therefore, peace. It sounds idealistic, but it has to work.

After living with you and like you for a whole year, may I take President Kennedy's words and say, "I am a Chagrinite!" When I get home, as many things will seem ridiculous there as when I first came here. When I came to Chagrins, I felt homesick. At home I will be feeling homesick again - for my home here.

Athlete of the Year - Bob Godwin

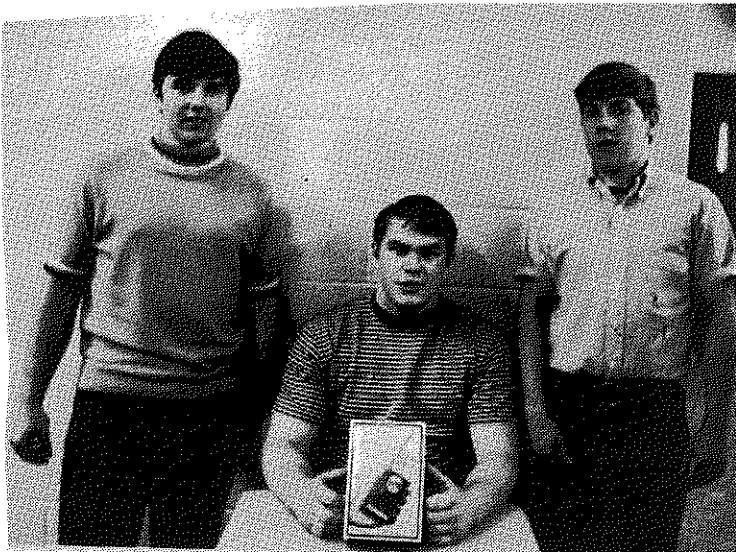

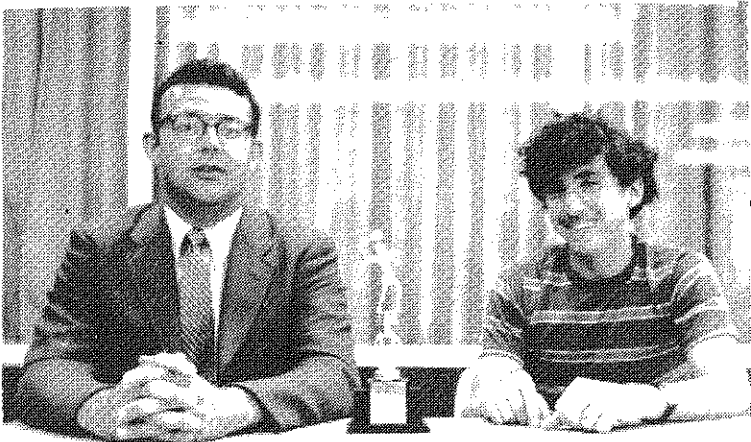

In the Districts, Alan Goepfinger playing singles, lost to the fourth-rated Geneva High player, with the score 6-1, 6-2.

Chris Wilson, playing singles, lost 6-0, 6-2 to Geneva's second-seat player. Doubles were played by Lad Lavicka and Craig Goepfinger, who lost to Geneva. Jef Morrow and Bob Miller won twice in the doubles by beating Gil-mour 6-4, Solon 6-1, 6-2, and Willoughby South 6-4, 6-1. The Tigers were then beaten by Euclid 6-2, and 6-3; Euclid then went on to the State Tournaments.

Amateur Baseball's Centennial Year

The year 1969 marks professional baseball's 100th anniversary. Before 1869 baseball was an amateur sport which was controlled by the National Association of Baseball Players. The Cincinnati Red Stockings, organized as an amateur team in 1866, announced in 1869 that it would operate as a professional group. The club made deals with players, agreeing to pay each a certain sum for a season of play and increased the admission fee from 25 cents to 50 cents.

Mr. A.B. Champion, a Cincinnati Lawyer, was president of the club. The great Harry Wright managed the team and received a salary of \$1200 for the season.

The other players' salaries scaled from \$600, paid to a utility player, to around \$1,000 for an eight-month season, from March 15 through November 15.

The Cincinnati Red Stockings first journeyed east, then returned for a home stand before invading the middle west. Then

going east once more, they met all of the outstanding teams, re-visited the Middle West, then to the Pacific coast, defeating three strong teams there. Red Stockings won 39 straight before being held to a 17-17 tie by the Hay-makers of Troy, N.Y., and finished the season with 65 victories and one tie. They scored 2,395 runs, against 574 by their opponents, and hit 169 homers. Ace George Wright, playing 52 of the 56 games, scored 339 runs and hit 59 home runs, had a batting average of .518. Cincinnati traveled 12,000 miles that year, played to 200,000 paid admissions, and their share in receipts wrote a page in black ink ending up with a profit of \$1.39.

The tour was then resumed in 1870, and the greatest winning streak in all baseball history was broken when the Red Stockings were halted by the Brooklyn Atlantics in the 11th inning. Cincinnati had 92 victories and one tie in 93 starts.
