We're special at Chagrin. We're in the 10% bracket for response to the United Appeal ... the lowest 10%. Of approximately one-hundred schools in the Cleveland area, CFHS ranks as one of the lower ten.

In order to find out whether neighboring schools had the same problem, the LANTERN staff conducted a survey in seven schools. Kenston, Shaker Heights, and Brush collected over 100% of their goal. At West G., contributions were improved 100%, doubling those of last year. Among the schools questioned, Mayfield and Beachwood ranked lowest with 90% and 75%. Oh, in case you haven't heard, we realized only 44% of our goal.
