

Co-ed is More Fun

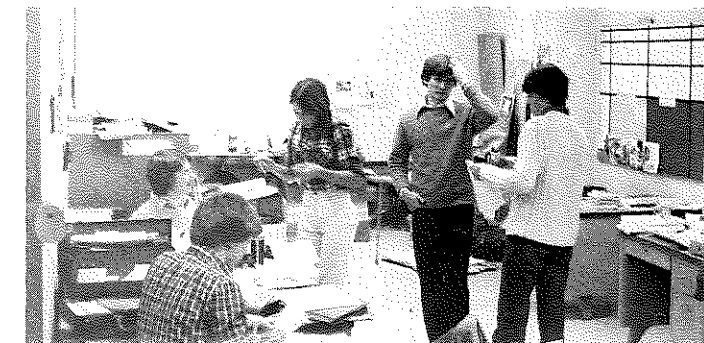

Weekend Tournaments are keeping the Chagrin Falls High School Debate Club very busy this season, as this, according to club president, Brad Leigh, "is a building year for the team."

This year's debating subject, debated by all schools, is comprehensive medical care. The debate club meets almost

every day after school to research or to be counseled by club advisor, Mr. Leonard Balk. Some researching is done at Case Western Reserve University and the Cleveland Public Library.

The tournaments are held every weekend, some on Saturday, and others are overnight tournaments. Saturday tournaments are three rounds and require a team of four men to participate. The Debate Club, with about 20 members, has debated some of the more difficult teams in the nation. They have matched wits with Cincinnati Princeton, who are National Champs, and Centerville High School, who are Georgetown University Workshop Champs.

would like to also meet on Thursdays after school. During these four hour meetings, some 20 members work on group and individual projects.

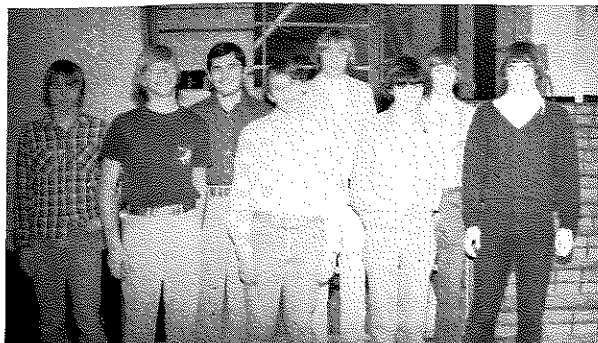
Shop Club's latest endeavors include building a fireplace for the Drama room, making a bulletin board and benches for the Commons John, for CAB, and installing

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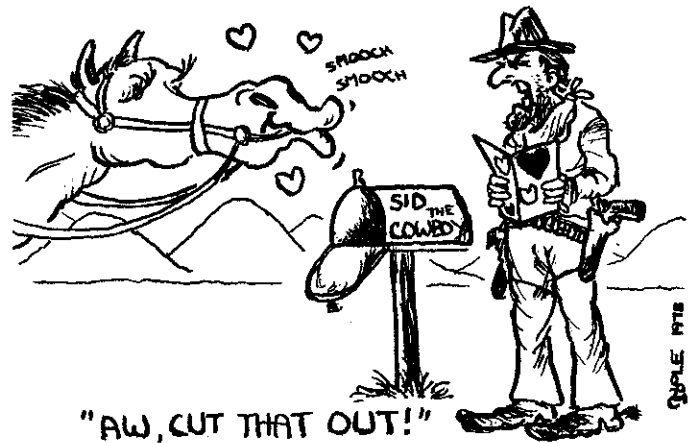
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Letter to the Editor Sr. Officers Reply

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Beachwood Exhibits Dali

If you haven't been to an art museum for a long time, you may be surprised to find that there is an excellent one only ten minutes away. The Salvador Dali Museum, located in Beachwood, on 2450 Commerce Park Road (right off of Chagrin Blvd.), is the only museum in the United States dedicated to the work of a single, living artist, and it is well worth your time to see it.

Salvador Dali, best known for his paintings of floppy watches and clocks, combines an almost unbelievable imagination with a realistic style of painting. In other words, his people look like real people, as compared to Picasso's two faced abstractions. You do not have to debate about what Dali paints, but rather *why* he paints it.

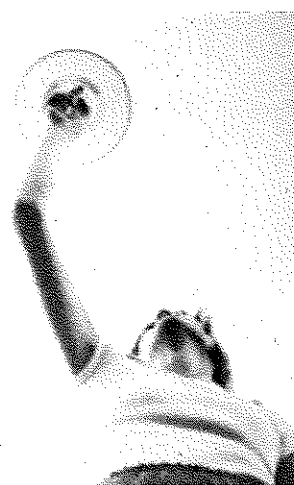
Looking at a Dali painting is a mindboggling experience, to

put it mildly. His canvases teem with fantastic, weird ideas and contortion of spaces and images. For example, in "Myself at Ten When I was the Grasshopper Child", he paints a boy at play, but the head is elongated, and his expression is such that he resembles a grasshopper, this point reflecting the artist's own fear of grasshoppers. Even the title leaves you wondering, as is the case in his "Fountain of Milk Spreading Itself Useless on Three Shoes", in which there are no shoes to be seen.

Dali uses a variety of nifty techniques to express his ideas. Some of them include Dalinian double images, where you see one of two images, depending on how you look at it, and the moving holograph, a three dimensional image created by laser beams. One of his paintings

consists of a mass of squares and small pictures up close, and becomes a face as you move back from the picture. In some of his paintings, he will repaint one of his former paintings in the corner of the one. Therefore, the more time you spend studying Dali's art, the more you will find to study and enjoy. And the nice thing about it is that you do not need to know anything about art to appreciate his work. Dali's psychoanalytical genius, which sometimes seems to border on extreme psychosis, will force you to react violently—either pro or con.

If you feel adventurous, then, a trip to the Dali Museum is worth your time. Remember to call before you go, because it is not a public museum. The number is 464-0372 and the hours are 10 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4 Tuesday through Saturday.

Do you know what is 10" long, flat and plastic? No, not the cafeteria's hamburgers; a frisbee. That is what has earned Annie Latuk the title of Northeast Ohio Overall Women's champion.

She achieved that title by entering the Northeast Ohio tournament that was held last July at Orange High School. The tournament consisted of 6 different events. They were: Distance--farthest thrown, Freestyle--a routine judged on a scale of 1-10, Thrown, Run and Catch--where the player throws the frisbee in a "boomerang" style and the distance is measured to where he/she catches it, Maximum Time Aloft--the "boomerang" style is used and the time the disc stays aloft is recorded, Accuracy--where the disc is thrown through hula hoops and Frisbee Golf--which is just like golf, except a frisbee is used and the course is composed of natural objects and each hole is ended by hitting a designated object. 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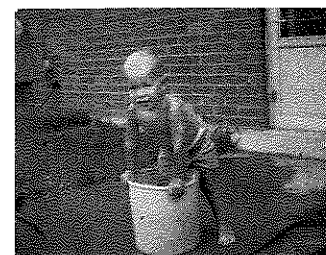
Dodger Releases Artful Album

To Peaches, I wish a Bag of miniature marshmallows and a good time for once and most of all a Happy Valentine's Day. Batman.

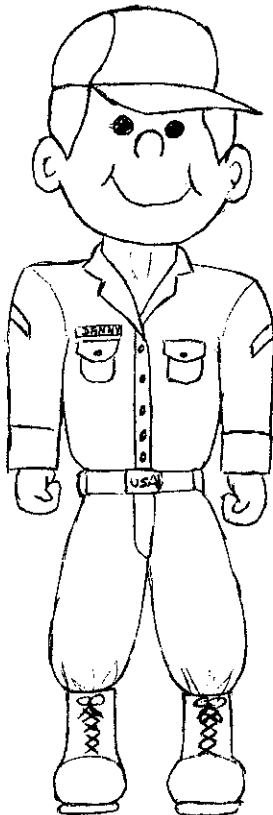
I would like to wish D.C.M., senior, a Happy V. Day. Also I would like to wish the 7* CAB room group a Happy V. Day.

During the five months that I have learned about Chagrin Falls . . . I already feel really Americanized! Although there were a lot of differences between Chagrin Falls and my town in Belgium, it didn't take me a long time to get used to it and to get to know it. I think a first reason, therefore, is because the people in Chagrin Falls are really nice and friendly. They were especially open to me and I could feel they accepted me from the beginning. I never felt uncomfortable when I met persons for the first time and I can say I made a lot of friends too. Another thing that I experienced is that many persons showed they really care about me and also are interested in my own personality and in my country. That makes me feel like being a real member of the Chagrin Falls' community! And that's what A.F.S. is all about, right? Also in school I had the same experience. In the beginning though I was a little bit lost

because I knew nobody and nobody knew me. But after a while, everybody kept asking me if I was the A. F.S. student from Belgium and how I liked Chagrin. Some people asked if I needed some help with the language; others invited me to go to parties, the movies, to go out for dinner . . . which was really nice. It was also my first time I went to a public school, because in Belgium I went to a Catholic girls' school! There was quite a difference although I didn't think it would be like that before I came. I don't think there is so much contact between the girls and guys in this school, unless you have a boyfriend or girlfriend, of course. Even in the classes most of the time the girls and guys are nicely separated! In school I also have a lot of fun every day. That was not the case in my ex-school. School in Belgium means a rather serious thing and you have to work a lot to pass your year. The teachers also are really strict; we have a

lot of examinations and the students are really nervous. I like the way the students come to school here, I mean they are not nervous at all. They are relaxed and even talk and make jokes during a test. That's impossible in Belgium! I can say school is a lot easier here for me than at home. I used to study 4 hours a day and compared with here . . . (I better don't talk about that). The school system is also different. We have to study the courses the government tells us (about 16 courses spread out over the whole week). Here you can choose your own courses (and only 5 or 6). And when one or two of those courses are gym, art, . . . I think everybody has to admit school can't be difficult (although I sometimes hear students complaining! The only course I complain about is senior biology. A little bit confusing, right Mr. Battles?). There are also a lot of activities in school here. I'm involved in a lot of them and I enjoy it very much. Maybe there is a little bit too much accent on amusement in school, especially sports. C.F.H.S. is a small school where everybody knows everybody, but where you cannot keep a secret. . . news spreads like wild-fire! Every day I have a new experience in school or in the Chagrin Falls community that will always be in my mind for the rest of my life . . . Happy memories never to forget!

The first game was a 73-56 all-out victory over Aurora. It started out as a close game with the Tigers only leading by two baskets at the end of the third quarter. The Tigers really moved in the final eight minutes with 28 points to seal the victory.

Chip Wiper led the scoring with a career high of 32 points, with 26 of them coming in the second half. Wiper

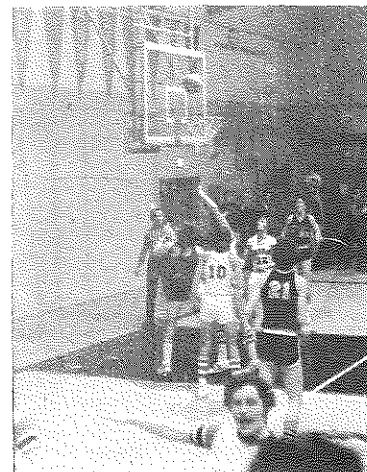
The Tigers really took over when they stole the CVC lead with a 77-58 victory over the Wolverines.

It's still a close race in the CVC with a few valuable weeks to go. The Tigers have 4 games to go at this time, with an 8-2 record. Only two teams in the league have defeated the Tigers this season, Orange and Kenston. Orange isn't out of the race yet either, as they are in a third place tie with Solon with a 7-3 record. West Geauga is now hanging on to second place with their record at 8-3.

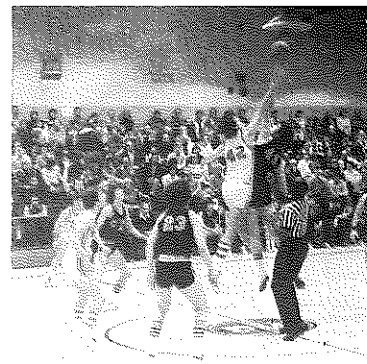
