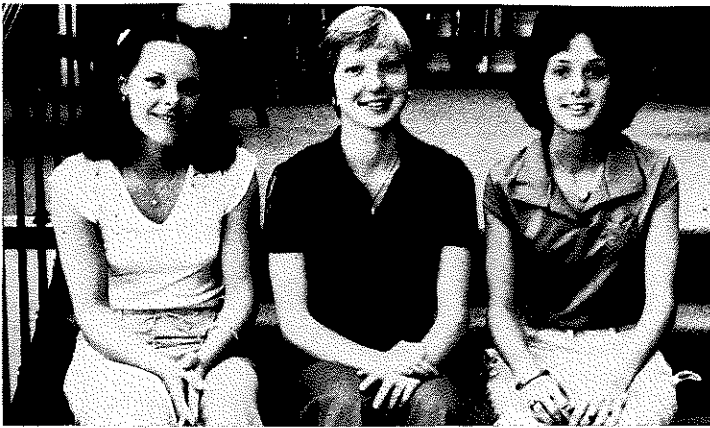

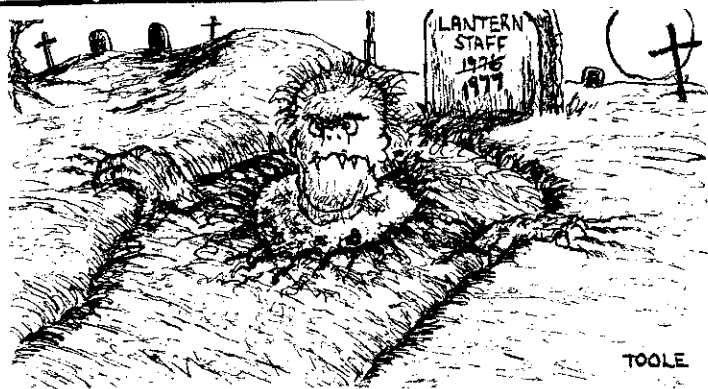

A mock demonstration of rescue techniques by area fire squads will immediately follow the crowning at Riverside Park. There will be a special 3-dollar opening night carnival rate on Thursday, May 26. Carnival hours that night will be from 6:00 p.m.-11:00 p.m.

Saturday, May 28, which has been named "Kiddie Day" includes these activities at Riverside Park: Beautiful Baby Contest, 10:00 a.m.; Bicycle Decorating Contest, 11:45; Pet Contest 12:15 p.m.; Bubblegum Contest, 1:15; and Watermelon Eating Contest, 1:45. Thirty-eight people entered their kites and approximately 100 more came to spend a lovely Mother's Day afternoon viewing the contest. Several

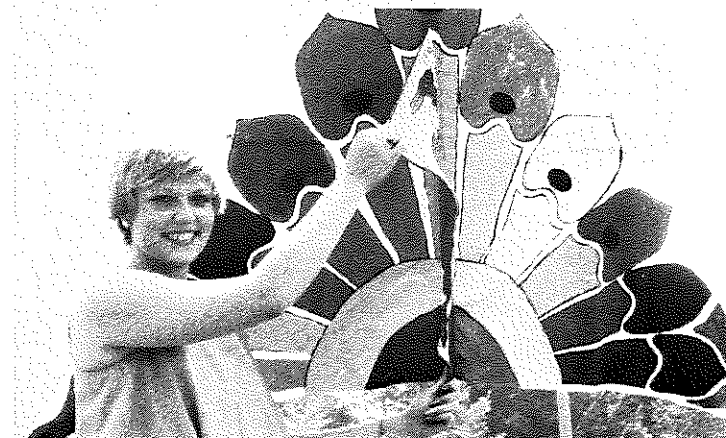
entrants traveled all the way from Shaker and Garfield Heights.

Senior Cathy Bennett proudly displays her 2nd place winning "Prettiest Kite" for ages 16-59.

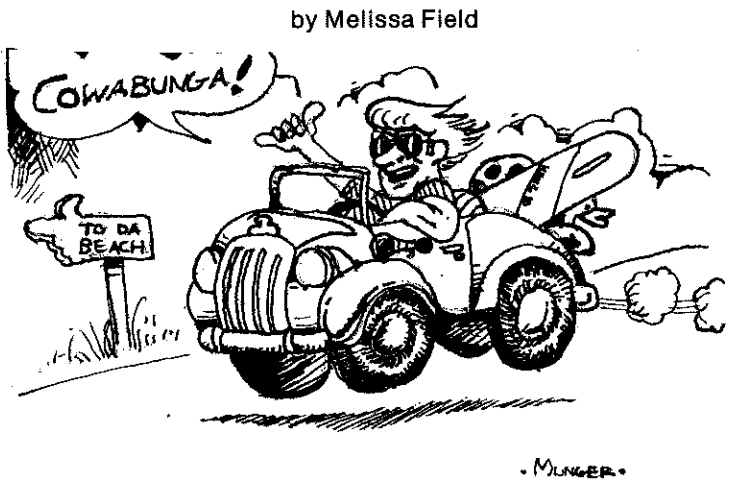
European Travels Begin

Witty Woody Whips up A Wishy Waschy Winner

Annie Hall, Woody Allen's latest film is a neurotic autobiography that rarely falters in coming up with some intelligent joke or castrating insight. It's probably even a healthy film to watch if you're a closet or even a normal neurotic, because Allen gives your problems company by exposing the insane follies that we find in ourselves and in those other gay vipers around us.

Annie Hall is a loosely structured love story between Annie Hall, well-played by Diane Keaton, and Alvy Singer, embodied by Allen himself. The loose structure allows Allen to take shots at numerous things from Freud to grade school, and he labels them all with witty precision. But behind this funny collection of one liners seems to be Allen's dissatisfaction if not occasional dislike for certain aspects of life. It's these little criticisms of others, himself, and even that dissatisfaction itself that are revealing. These insights raise the value of Annie Hall above the regular farce.

Technically, Allen is fidgety but that blends well with his nervous subjects. Some performances are not full, but that seems excusable in a

comedy where the emphasis is on a person's follies rather than on the whole person.

One warning to aimless film viewers: some of Woody Allen's jokes may induce confusion rather than laughter. Annie Hall is literate. And

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Kites to be Flying High This Summer

When school lets out in June, the long relaxing (much needed) summer begins. Many students will vacation with families or work during the summer months. But until school opens again, many will have let idle time slip by spent in boredom. Well, that need not happen if a hobby is taken up and for this summer kiting is "in".

The art of kiting is steeped in tradition. The origin of kites can be traced back to ancient China where in 500 A.D. kites were used as military signals. This was to alert farmers to

become soldiers and report to the Emperor's Palace - ready to fight. In China today, kites are symbols of good luck and are frequently used in celebrations and festivities. In England in 1825, a man called George Pocock experimented with kites and finally invented a "charvolant", a wheeled carriage, that was kite propelled. Although it was impractical it was an ingenious idea. Kites were constantly being experimented with and new designs were created.

Kites come in all different sizes and shapes. There are

flat kites, bowed kites, box kites, Oriental and sled kites, delta, parafoil and parawing kites. Each suits a different purpose and requires different building and flying techniques. The easiest kite to fly is the basic two sticker flat kite (diamond shaped) and is maybe the most fun. It is simple to construct, all that is needed is scissors, glue, 2 lightweight sticks and some flying line (or string). By the same token it is easy to fly. Any kite is fun to fly though, and one should experiment and find the one to suit their needs.

Kites can be flown anywhere and are exhilarating to watch as they sweep and dive through the sky. As long as

there are no trees, telephone poles, strong winds or houses nearby, a kite will stay up in the air indefinitely and provide inexpensive entertainment. So when somebody says "Go fly a kite" this summer, do it!

White Band Ranks Far from Average

The Average White Band has earned a reputation in the music business that almost every funk-based band envies. They are accepted by both black and white audiences, and each of their albums has produced at least one hit single, and on one album, three.

Now AWB has put out their long-awaited double record, LiveSet, and it further reinforces their reputation. 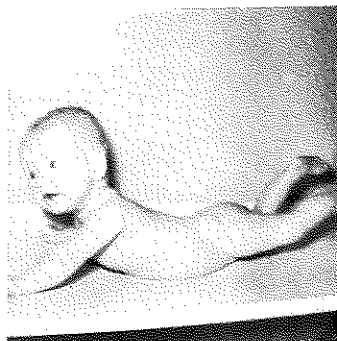
Partying & Painting Occupies the Weekend

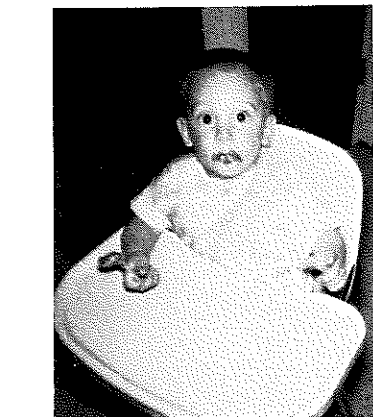

The senior baby boy has brown hair. He played football and his brother is a '76 graduate.

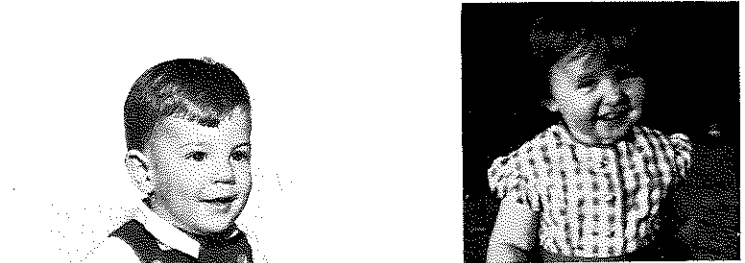

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Spring Sports Wrap-Up

The Tiger Varsity baseball team has kept rolling on in recent weeks with wins over Aurora, Kenston and Twinsburg. They also knocked off Beachwood in AA Sectional action, before losing to Benedictine in the Sectional finals. In other games, the Tigers lost to West Geauga, Solon and Chardon.

In the Sectionals against Beachwood, the Tigers won handily, 8-4. Senior Dale Holihan was the winning pitcher, striking out 10, while yielding only three hits. In the Sectional finals, the Tigers fell to Benedictine, 8-6, in extra innings.

In CVC action, the Tigers edged Aurora, 2-1, behind the two-hit pitching of Dale Holihan. The Tigers scored their two runs on five hits and one error. Against Kenston, the Tigers trounced the Bombers, 12-3, behind the pitching of seniors Dallas Ward and Tim McWilliams. The Tigers collected twelve hits, with senior Paul Gamble and junior Bob Bistriz each going three for four at the plate. Twinsburg was soundly defeated by the Tigers, 13-0, in another CVC game.

Against West Geauga, the Tigers were narrowly beaten 1-0. Also registering wins against the Tigers were Solon, 7-0, and Chardon, 4-0. Poor fielding was a factor against Solon, as the Tigers committed three errors. In the Chardon game, they lost as a no-hitter was thrown at them.

With opponents Solon and Kenston remaining, the varsity men's tennis squad defeated six opposing teams while losing only three. Orange and Aurora, who are contending for the CVC crown as expected, are responsible for two of the Tiger's losses.

Chagrin slipped by West Geauga (3-2) by winning both doubles match and 3rd singles. First, sophomores, Peter Herr and Jim Meyer trounced Wolverines Kathy Pleshington and Mike Dolen (6-1) in the first set, and then

won 7-5 in the second set. Juniors, J. B. Raftus and Dave Alpeter were also victorious winning 6-3, 6-2.

The Tigers then defeated Twinsburg (4-1) on wins in singles competition by sophomore Chip Wiper and junior Mike Rabin. The doubles teams of Herr and sophomore Jack Campbell, and Raftus and Alpeter also won.

The doubles team of Wiper and Rabin seeded sixth, placed fifth in the sectional at Euclid to qualify them for District competition in Akron, losing only one match. In the sectional tournament, the four teams who advance to the semi-finals, having not been defeated, automatically qualify for the District tourney. Rabin and Wiper with one loss, defeated the other single loss teams for fifth place to and qualification to Districts.

Lantern Sports wishes Chip Wiper and Mike Rabin good luck in the District and to the rest of the team in their remaining matches.

The Chagrin Falls track team tuned up for the upcoming CVC meet by capturing the Hudson AA sectional tournament Friday, May 13.

Youngstown North trailed the Tigers by only two points going into the final event, but a school record time of 3:27.5 in the mile relay by juniors Doug Revelle and Jim Lynch, and seniors Al Peterson and Glenn Hamilton clinched the victory.

Lynch also won the 880 with a time of 2:00.3. Peterson skimmed over the high hurdles in 14.9 for a second place, and Hamilton took third in the 440, second in the 100, and set a meet record in the 220 by sprinting the distance in 22.5. Sophomore Kevin Conneighton also qualified for the regionals at Kent, finishing third in the high jump at 6'3.24".

The victory is one of the many this season for head coach John Stanton and the team. The Tigers have been defeated but once in a dual or tri meet by Kent Roosevelt and Mayfield, and have not yet dropped a league meet. There have been some close ones, though. Chardon fell by only three points, and Solon stayed close down to the final event where Chagrin's mile relay team again pulled out a victory.

Along the way, outstanding performances were recorded by Glenn Hamilton in the 100,

220, and 440; Al Peterson in both hurdles and the high jump; Kevin Conneighton in the high jump; seniors Chip Weiant in the mile and two mile; Geoff Lynch in the mile; and Dave Pitz, who broke the school record in the discus with a throw of 141 feet.

In the league meet at Aurora, the Tigers had to finish first to win the CVC crown outright, but the outcome was not known at press time. Chardon and Solon provided the strongest competition.

The girls' track team has had an outstanding season so far this year. With the CVC dual meet season over, the girls are in second place. They ended up 6-1, but the girls had the chance to redeem themselves if they beat Twinsburg in the league meet on May 16 and 17 (which could not be determined at press time).

The girls have competed in only two big meets so far this season. In the Solon Coed meet, they placed fourth out of thirteen teams and in the WRA Relays, they placed second out of fifteen schools. Some of those teams in the WRA Relays traveled from Akron and Pennsylvania to compete.

The most important part of the girls' season is just around the corner: the Sectional, District, and State Track meets. The Sectional meet is at Mantua Crestwood this year. The girls ran on Friday, the 20th, and Saturday, the 21st to see who qualified for the Kent Districts. Coach Jim Halloran thought that if everyone ran up to their potential, quite a few girls would qualify for Districts on the 27th and 28th. Mr. Halloran thought the best hopes for District berths were freshman Teri Hutson in the 100; senior Debbie Bernard in the long jump and 220; freshman Mary Jo Dietrich in the 880; freshman Jan Gardner and sophomore Julie Webster in the 440; sophomore Kelly Mahoney and senior Chris Conneighton in the high jump; and any of the relay teams.
