Chagrin Schools Earn Recognition

On the 2021-22 Ohio School Report Card, Chagrin Falls Schools had the 3rd highest performance index score in the State of Ohio (out of 607 school districts). The school is also one of only five districts in the State of Ohio with a performance index percentage higher than 100% on the 2021-22 Ohio School Report Card. In another evaluation, Chagrin is 1 of only 12 districts in the entire state to have five stars in every category on the report card. Five stars is the highest rating for districts.

National Merit Honors for CF Students

Chagrin Falls Schools are pleased to announce that two students have been named National Merit Semifinalists by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. The students are Michaela Plante and Rose Zabik. Semifinalists are the highest scorers in each of the 50 states and represent less than one percent of each state's high school seniors. Finalists will be announced in February. In addition to the semifinalists, Broderick (Bode) Freese, Ryan Hill and Jenna Santamaria have been named National Merit Commended Scholars. More than two-thirds (about 34,000) of the approximately 50,000 high scorers on the PSAT/NMSQT receive Letters of Commendation in recognition of their outstanding academic promise.

Winter Athletics Season Recap

The hockey team finished the season with a record of 15-8 and finished 2nd in the GCHSHL Blue East. The wrestling team finished 6th place in the CVC and had 4 qualify to districts. The boys' basketball team ended the season with a record of 13-11 and finished in 3rd place in the CVC. The girls' basketball team had a 16-7 record this year and won the CVC. The girls' swimming and diving Team came in 2nd place in the CVC and 6 girls qualified for states. The boys' team won the CVC and also had 6 that qualified for state.

This winter we had 29 athletes receive their 2nd year varsity award, 13 receive their 3rd year varsity award, and 12 who received their 4th varsity award. CFHS had 13 athletes make 1st team all-conference, 12 make 2nd team all-conference, and 13 were named Honorable Mention all-conference. Beth Sonnhalter and John Reagan were recognized as the CVC Boys and Girls Swimming and Diving Coaches of the Year and the D2 Girls District Coaches of the year.

This years 2023 Girls Basketball CVC Coach of the Year is **Brittany Anderson Laseak '04.** She lead her team to a record of 16-7 and won the Chagrin Valley Conference. Junior Samantha Holtz won the 2023 D2 state title in diving with a score of 454.95. She placed 3rd as a freshman and was 4th last year. This is the third state championship in swimming and diving on the girls' side for Chagrin with **Diana Munz '00** (200 freestyle - '98 & '99; 500 freestyle - '98 & '99) and **Lauren Preyss '03** (100 freestyle - '00 - '03; 200 freestyle - '01 & '02) being the others. She is the 2nd diver to win at Chagrin, joining **Jamie Englhardt '10** from the boys' side. Samantha is committed to continue her education and diving career at Harvard University.

53 Year Old Mystery Solved

A 53-year-old mystery was solved recently concerning a cake that was sent to the Orange football team in 1970 before they traveled to Chagrin to face the unbeaten Tigers. The message on the cake said Orange was the worst football team in the world and that Chagrin would destroy them. The Orange players believed the Chagrin players sent the cake and used it as motivation. At that point, the Lions had lost all three of their games and had scored only one touchdown. The powerhouse Tigers were 3 and 0, having outscored their opponents 106 to 8. The Chagrin-Orange game was supposed to be a colossal mismatch. It wasn't. The mysterious cake and its message motivated the Lions and they

took it out on the Tigers. All night long, Orange exploited a weakness in the Chagrin defense. The Lions led 15 to 6 at halftime and increased their lead in the second half to 27 to 12. But Chagrin pulled off an astounding comeback.

First, a **Dave Batchelor '71** touchdown and a two-point conversion cut the Orange lead to 27 to 20. That was the score with 1:25 left in the game. Then, quarterback **Skip Church '71** threw his second touchdown pass of the game, this one to wide receiver **John Abbott '71** for 35 yards.

However, Chagrin still trailed by one point 27 to 26. Wingbacks **Bill Groth '71** and **Richard Leach '71**, who alternated as messengers bringing in plays, delivered something special. On the play, Church faked to **Paul Snavely '71**, lateralled to Batchelor who threw it to the late **Jeff Smith '71**. Miraculously, the play worked and Chagrin completed a 28 to 27 come from behind victory.

After the win, Tiger offensive tackles **Duncan Othen '71** and the late **Dave Crowle '71**, wearing Chagrin letter jackets, went to Manners Big Boy in Orange for a celebratory meal. There, they were greeted by several Orange football players who asked if they had sent the cake to the Lions. Duncan and Dave didn't know what they were talking about. So, the Orange players took them out to the parking lot and opened the trunk of their car to show them the cake. The Lion players said it was the cake that inspired them to play a great game against Chagrin, one that just barely fell short.

For nearly 53 years, the mystery of the cake has haunted Duncan, never knowing who sent it. Finally, in January 2023, one of the Lions who played in the game for Orange, told Dave Batchelor that an Orange assistant coach sent the cake to motivate their winless team. That cake almost worked.

The Tigers would go on to win a share of the Chagrin Valley Conference crown that year and begin what, two and a half years later, would become a 28-game winning streak, the longest in Ohio.

The Heard - Chagrin's First Rock and Roll Band

The youth of the 60s grew up in a very turbulent time – the Cold War, the Cuban missile crisis, the President Kennedy assassination, and the Vietnam War. Meanwhile, the American pop music scene was rapidly evolving in a youthful direction, from songs like "Rock Around the Clock," and "Tutti Fruity" and "Hound Dog" in the 50s and "Blowin' in the Wind" in the early 60s, to teen angst ballads, Motown, surf music, folk rock, and psychedelia in the mid 60s. But that momentum underwent a truly seismic shift when the Beatles led the "British Invasion" and exploded onto the U.S. scene in 1964.

Suddenly, everyone wanted to be a Rock and Roll star. A group of Chagrin High School sophomores and juniors thought "Why not us?" So, in Spring 1964, eight teenagers formed Chagrin's (and its high school's) first rock band. They called themselves The Heard. And heard they were - by literally thousands of fans - over the next 18 months. By any measure, The Heard was a smashing success!

The original Heard included eight members: **Tom Anderson '66**, rhythm guitar; **Ron Baker '66**, bass; **Chris Cary '65**, harmonica and vocals; **John Cary '66**, lead guitar; **Rick Johnson '65**, keyboards; **Mike Mahon '65**, drums; **John Marsh '65**, vocals; and **Don Raker '65**, vocals. Sadly, only Johnson and Raker survive.

The Heard initially played publicly for fun at friends' parties in their homes. That soon evolved into sock hops in the high school gym, and the Orange and Black Revue at Philomethian School auditorium. They played an end-of-summer outdoor concert in the Chagrin Shopping Plaza before hundreds of fans in front of Finch's Chagrin Department Store. This caused the group to consider the financial potential of their growing popularity. They rented the Chagrin Falls Township Hall on North Main Street and charged admission to their shows. It worked!

Looking for a larger venue, they began to rent the National Guard Armory on East Washington Street, where they were able to bring in a significantly larger gate. Exposure there led to engagements outside of Chagrin at several different venues. One memorable out-of-town gig took place at the Alpine Valley ski resort in Chesterland. They were hired to provide music at an apres-ski party organized by a Cleveland-based ski club comprising about 40 twentysomethings. It was an open bar and there wasn't a chaperone in sight. Supposed to play until 10 pm, they were still playing at 12:30 am! A good time was had by all.

Then, seeking broader exposure, the boys entered the media realm – they auditioned for, and were booked on the Gene Carroll Show, a local Cleveland televised talent contest (at a time when most TV was broadcast live).

Unfortunately, despite much support from their loyal Chagrin followers, they came in a close second to a matronly lady and her accordion. Such were the vagaries of show business. And it was a gut check for The Heard: apparently, polka was more popular than Rock and Roll - at least in Cleveland, Playing in a band taught them many things, including the critical importance of compromise (essential when half the band favored the music of the Beatles and the other half were Beach Boys die-hards); the satisfaction of working together and seeing teamwork pay off (with no supervising adult(s); and the sheer joy of performing live before appreciative fans, both high school friends and perfect strangers standing and rocking side-by-side, dancing to the music and, yes, screaming until they were hoarse.

In a word, The Heard was FUN!

Betcha' Didn't Know

Excerpts from History of the Chagrin Falls Schools, 1833 - 1960 by Tom Mattern '55:

Schools today are asked to do more and more things that were once done by the home and/or community. There was a time, however, when the Chagrin Falls Schools and a local doctor went beyond the call of duty.

One tidbit from the 1920s dealt with schools and tonsils. Beginning in 1925 and for the next 15 years, a local doctor, Chauncey Wycoff '00, would arrange to spend a day each year at the old Philomethian Street School, the one torn down in 1940. He was there to take out students' tonsils at a cost of \$7.50 per student in the old building's Assembly Hall. With their parents' permission, students would line up and wait to be called. Once called, they would be given a little ether and have their tonsils removed. The tonsils were then thrown into buckets and the youngsters placed on cots and given ice cream and pieces of ice to chew. Once recovered, the children were sent home......

What happened to the buckets of tonsils remains a mystery. One probability is that they ended up at the old village dump on Solon Road, which is known as River Run Park.

In the late 1930s, and into the 1940s the senior class had a Kid Day at the end of the school year where the class would dress up as little children and just "act silly." The class of 1942 was informed by the school administration that Kid Day was cancelled due to the seriousness of World War II which had just begun. Disappointed, the class decided to have a different kind of day and to cut school and "play hooky" at the shelter house in the Metropolitan Park. With the military draft looming ahead for the senior boys, one last fling seemed appropriate. Margaret Manley Batchelor '42 remembered that the class was punished with three additional days of school. The teachers were not amused. It remains a cherished memory for the class of 1942.

Norm Fry came to Chagrin Falls in 1937 to teach industrial arts (shop). Through the years he had many "firsts" to his credit. For example, during World War II, he worked evenings in the school with a group of juniors and seniors who built, to specification, model airplanes -- replicas of the fighter planes and bombers that were being used in the war. These models were then used by the United States government to teach soldiers identification of planes. What he was most remembered for was the use of his famous paddle. Norm retired in 1977 after "forty years of fun!"
