CFMS Named U.S. Department of Education 2024 National Blue Ribbon School

U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona today designated Chagrin Falls Middle School as one of the 356 schools in the nation to be named a 2024 National Blue Ribbon School. This prestigious recognition highlights schools that excel in academic performance or make significant strides in closing achievement gaps among different student groups.

“This is an incredible honor for Chagrin Falls Middle School,” said Superintendent Dr. Jennifer Penczarski, Chagrin Falls Schools. “This recognition is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our teachers, staff, administrators, students, and families. It reflects our commitment to the goals outlined in our Strategic Plan: promoting high-quality learning experiences and inspiring all to grow and thrive.”

“Chagrin Falls Middle School is such a special place where we strive to build instructional connections, systems and meaningful, positive relationships,” said Principal Laila Discenza, Chagrin Middle School. “Our high achievement roots in the foundation of belonging, value and collaboration in order for students to be most likely to succeed. I am beyond proud and excited that we have been recognized as a National Blue Ribbon School as this prestigious honor reflects the hard work, dedication, and excellence that define us.”

Chagrin Falls Middle School also was honored with this recognition in 2010. This year, of the 353 schools recognized nationally, 14 were from Ohio. Just as impressive, only 43 middle schools across the nation earned the distinction this year.

Chagrin Falls Schools Celebrate Exceptional Performance on Ohio State Report Cards

At the September 18 Chagrin Falls Board of Education regular meeting, Superintendent Dr. Jennifer Penczarski presented a remarkable overview of the District's performance on the recently released Ohio School Report Cards. The results paint a picture of consistent growth and excellence across all schools in the District.

Dr. Penczarski emphasized the importance of viewing these results in the context of growth over time, particularly the last three years. “The growth that this District has made is just unbelievable,” she stated, highlighting that Chagrin Falls has shown growth in its Performance Index for three consecutive years, a feat uncommon among top-performing districts.”

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Key highlights from the report include:

1. Gurney Elementary:

- Ranked 2nd in the state for the early literacy component
- Ranked 3rd in the state based for elementary schools Performance Index percentage
- Ranked 8th in the state for percentage proficient in both English language arts (ELA) and Math on 3rd grade OST (Ohio State Tests)

2. Chagrin Falls Intermediate School:

- Ranked 2nd in the state for intermediate schools in Performance Index percentage
- Earned the highest rating of 5 stars in gap closing
- Ranked 17th in the state for percent proficient on 6th grade ELA OST

3. Chagrin Falls Middle School:

- Ranked 2nd in the state for middle schools in Performance Index percentage
- Ranked 3rd in the state for percentage proficient in 8th grade ELA OST
- Ranked 6th in the state for percentage proficient in 7th grade ELA OST

4. Chagrin Falls High School:

- Ranked 2nd in the state for high schools in Performance Index percentage
- Ranked 2nd in the state for percent proficient in Biology and English II End of Course exams
- Demonstrated significant evidence of exceeding growth expectations over the past 3 years with a growth score of 24.68

Dr. Penczarski praised the collaborative effort across all schools, emphasizing that these achievements result from the hard work of all the teachers, staff members, and administrators throughout the District. She also noted that a more detailed presentation of the report card data will be given at the October Board meeting.

The superintendent concluded by expressing pride in the District's communication efforts, with Board members commending the accessibility and clarity of the information presented. This snapshot of the District's performance sets the stage for a series of more detailed communications to come, allowing the community to fully appreciate Chagrin Falls Schools' outstanding achievements.

Chagrin Falls Schools' Academic Distinction Displayed in 2024 Ohio Department of Education and Workforce Report Card

In the 2024 Ohio Department of Education and Workforce report cards released on September 13, Chagrin Falls Schools is once again one of Ohio's top school districts. With a Performance Index of 111 and a five-star rating across all categories, for more than a decade, Chagrin Falls Schools' commitment to excellence has solidified a reputation of academic distinction ranking the District as #3 in the state.

"This achievement of Chagrin Falls Schools is a testament to the efforts of our students, commitment of our teachers, support of our staff, leadership of our administrators, and collaboration of our community," said Superintendent Dr. Jennifer Penczarski, Chagrin Falls Schools. "Every star earned recognizes the unity, passion, and excellence that define our District. This year's results celebrate our growth and inspire us to continue to challenge our practices, creating new high quality experiences for all of our learners."

The District is proud to highlight these academic achievements on the State Report Card:

- **Five Star Achievement:** Chagrin Falls Schools is one of 68 districts in the state to earn an overall five-star rating, a distinction that reflects the District's high standards and dedicated efforts to support all students.
- **Excellence in All Components:** Chagrin Falls Schools is one of only 18 districts in the state to achieve a five-star rating in all five report card components: Achievement, Progress, Gap Closing, Graduation, and Early Literacy
- **PreK-12 Distinction:** All schools within the District, including Gurney Elementary, Chagrin Falls Intermediate School, Chagrin Falls Middle School, and Chagrin Falls High School, earned five stars in the School Achievement component, demonstrating consistent excellence across all grade levels.
- **Overall Rating:** Chagrin Falls Schools were rated 3rd overall in the state with a Performance Index (PI) of 111.003 and a PI percentage of 101.6%. The District was one of only six districts to score above 100 and earned a 5-star rating across all five components: Achievement, Progress, Gap Closing, Graduation, and Early Literacy.
- **Growth:** Chagrin Falls Schools' Performance Index has steadily increased from 97.9 in 2020 to 111 in 2024, showcasing its continuous commitment to educational excellence. The District is the only one in the top 5 schools who have seen growth over the last 3 years.
- **Early Literacy Success:** The District ranked 2nd in the state in Early Literacy, with a score of 98.6, supported by its initiatives like the Foundations literacy program for PreK-3rd grade.

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School building achievements include:

- Gurney Elementary School: Ranked 3rd school in the state based on a PI percentage of 103.6. (This is out of every single building at every grade level!)
- Chagrin Falls Intermediate School: Ranked 2nd in the state with a PI percentage of 99.2 and achieved the highest rating in Gap Closing.
- Chagrin Falls Middle School: Ranked 2nd in the state with a PI percentage of 101.5 and top rankings in ELA and Math OST performance.
- Chagrin Falls High School: Ranked 2nd in the state with a PI percentage of 100.3 and top 10 rankings in key end-of-course assessments.

“Test scores are one of the many metrics we review to ensure that we are meeting the needs of all of our students. We have seen consistent growth in our scores over the past four years,” stated President Lori Bendall, Chagrin Falls Board of Education. “This wouldn’t happen without the incredible effort by our entire learning community.”

The District’s commitment to continuous growth is deeply rooted in its community-driven Strategic Plan, which prioritizes high-quality learning experiences, student and staff well-being, and strategic resource allocation. The latest report card data validates the progress made toward these goals and serves as a valuable compass for guiding future efforts to ensure the growth and success of every student.

“Our continuous growth over the past few years shows thoughtful planning and collaboration,” said Principal of Data and Assessment Sarah Read, Chagrin Falls Schools. “The report card data provides valuable insights to the success we are seeing through our commitment to personalized learning. In the coming weeks, we will continue to analyze the data and provide the school community with more insights.”

The positive impact of the personalized learning approach is increasingly evident in the data, fostering a shared commitment to growth across all levels of the District. Educators are at the forefront of this work, remaining steadfast in their pursuit of fostering the growth of every student.

"We will continue to work hard to learn, grow, and improve the education delivery to our students and our services to students, families, and the Chagrin Falls' community," said President Lisa Salyers, Chagrin Falls Education Association. "Furthermore, we will maintain a persistent focus on our students—all that they are, and all that they can become."

Betcha Didn't Know

The Board of Education owned three school buses during the 1953-1954 school year and had 44 graduates. For the 2024-25 school year, Chagrin Falls has 24 school buses and 8 school vans, while we will have 118 seniors graduating at the end of this school year.

The Board of Education leased the current 7-12 school grounds starting in 1927 for 99 years. In 1955, they eventually purchased the property from the Cuyahoga County Commissioners for \$5000.

Excerpts below from *History of Chagrin Falls Schools, 1833-1960* by Tom Mattern

As the demand for more educational facilities continued to grow, on September 12, 1913, the board of education passed a "resolution of necessity," to build a new high school at an estimated cost of \$38,000. The original amount was not sufficient for the job and the board asked for an additional \$12,000. The election resulted in a vote of 120 for the levy, 117 against.....It completion made the Chagrin Falls School System the envy of surrounding communities. It even had 2 electric lights in each room and a "bubble fountain" (drinking fountain) on every floor. With its four-year high school curriculum and high school building, it became a favorite tuition school. Most schools in the area were still three-year high schools and remained so into the 1920s.

In the late 1930s and into the 1940s the senior class had a Kids Day at the end of the school year where the class would dress up as little children and just "act silly." The class of 1942 was informed by the school administration that Kids Day was cancelled due to the seriousness of World War II which had just begun. Disappointed, the class decided to have a different kind of day and to cut school and "play hooky" at the shelter house in Metropolitan Park. With the military draft looming ahead for the senior boys, one last fling seemed appropriate. The class was punished with three additional days of school. The teachers were not amused.

Beginning in 1925 and for the next 15 years, a local doctor, Chauncy Wyckoff (Class of 1900), would arrange to spend a day each year at the old Philomethian Street School, the one torn down in 1940. He was there to take out students' tonsils at a cost of \$7.50 per student in the old building's Assembly Hall. With their parents' permission, students would line up and wait to be called. Once called, they would be given a little ether and have their tonsils removed. The tonsils were then thrown into bucket and the youngster placed on cots and given ice cream and pieces of ice to chew. Once recovered, the children were sent home. This whole procedure was often observed by other local children through the window of the building.
